WAR NEWS.

CONFLICTING RUMORS.

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.]

LONDON, Jan. 26.

There is a rumor that the Russian General Stankoff has been ordered to reach the Dardanelles as soon as possible. He has twenty-four guns and a lot of torpedoes.

A large number of Turkish men-of-war have been ordered to Gallipoli at once.

It is now reported that peace is assured, the Russian terms having been communicated to England, orders have been given for the fleet to stop a month at the Dardanelles. But despite these rumors, preparations are actively going on for the defence of the lines around Constantinople, and 60,000 men are now available.

To the Editor of the Examiner:

SIR,—A decision lately arrived at by our worthy Stipendiary Magistrate seems to me to be of considerable interest to the travelling public. The case in which the referred to decision was given was one in which some persons, quietly driving along in an ordinary box-sleigh, were run into by a large load of brush, which monopolized the whole of the road, nearly swept the occupants of the sleigh out of their seats, and broke one of the runners. The worthy Magistrate ruled that, inasmuch as the driver of the box-sleigh had been so indiscreet as to touch the horse drawing the heavy load on the neck, so as to make it turn off slightly, and thus had escaped the total demolition of his sleigh, he had taken the law into his own hands, and could not expect to obtain any redress. This decision was, however, qualified by the worthy Magistrate; for, he said, that in a case where the driver of a sleigh was sound asleep, he would not go so far as to say that it would be illegal to touch his horse in a friendly way on the neck. The poorer classes, I am sorry to say, have few amusements; but I don't think that truckmen and others, who draw heavy loads, can be too grateful to Mr. Fitzgerald for suggesting such an inexpensive and pleasant pastime as that of sweeping all sleighs that they may have the gratification to meet with from the public roads. It may be suggested that the identification of those who indulge in this pleasant pastime is easy, and that there can be no doubt as to redress being obtainable.

I would simply ask how the driver of a sleigh, when left standing disconsolate amidst its ruins, is to identify the scoundrel who, well hid by his towering load, gallops off to escape detection? It might also suggest itself to the worthy Magistrate, that the travelling public, and especially strangers who have had the misfortune to come to this well-governed Isle, can hardly be expected to be intimately acquainted with the features of every ruffian of the class so highly favoured.
