TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
Another Marine Disaster.
NEW YORK, Nov. 11.
The Cunard steamer Umbria, Capt. McMechan, which sailed hence for Liverpool yesterday, returned this afternoon. During a dense fog she collided with the French steamer Iberia, Capt. Sagols, from Bussora, Sept. 25, for New York, striking her bow on. The Umbria's stem was started and a hole stove in her larboard bow. Twelve or fifteen of the Iberia's crew were picked up by the Umbria and brought to this port. A salvage crew of three men were put on board the Iberia this morning. She lies three miles off shore in an easy position and has about 14 feet of stern cut clear off. Other wise she is in good condition.
The Trade Question.
OTTAWA, Nov. 11.
It is understood that at a meeting of Council held yesterday it was decided to invite the Australian colonies and New Zealand to send delegates to Canada for the purpose of conferring upon the best means of promoting trade between Canada and Australasia. If the Antipolean colonies accept this invitation it is possible that the Pacific cable scheme will be considered. At present one half of the total trade of Australasia is with Great Britain.
A Fortunate Society.
OTTAWA, Nov. 11.
Rev. John Wood has been informed that the Congregational Home Missionary Society has just fallen heir to an estate as residuary legatee, which is variously estimated to be worth from \$150,000 to \$200,000. After payment of \$20,000 to other parties, the whole of the balance of the property will be handed over to the Society for missions in Canada.
Gladstone and Home Rule.
LONDON, Nov. 11.
The Economist contends Gladstone's statement that Home Rule is so rooted in the minds of the people that it will survive his leadership with undiminished vigor. "After the death of Gladstone," it says, "Home Rule will have to stand on its merits. Gladstone's present colleagues being all inferior, nobody is able to predict who his successors will be. His equals have abandoned him."
A Dastardly Act.
GODERICH, Ont., Nov. 11.
A dastardly attempt was made to wreck a mixed train near here last night by putting two square sticks of timber between the rails. The train was a heavy one, and the rails were slippery on account of rain. The train was going slowly at the time or there would have been a terrible disaster, as the fiends intended to run the train down a steep bank.
