Changes In Borden Carferry Schedules Take Place Today

The double ferry service at Borden-Tormentine which has been operating since July 15th changes today and the entire service will be carried on by the M.V. Abegweit, with four daily scheduled trips instead of the eight in effect during the summer months.

The service provided during the longer period this year, in which both the S.S. Prince Edward Island and the M.V. Abegweit operated, has resulted in a substantial increase in vehicle traffic due in some measure to the fact that tourists and commercial vehicles did not have to wait for long periods to get across.

Despite the fact that both ferries operated for a month longer this year than last season there were still a great many times when vehicles were left on the piers at both Borden and Tormentine and this was true also over the Thanksgiving holiday period just ended. With both boats operating the waits were not as long as in other years.

Evidence keeps piling up to show the necessity of immediately preparing for increased traffic facilities both at Borden and Wood Islands. This is a matter that not only affects Prince Edward Island but the other Provinces as well with whom we have an expanding two way traffic.

Mr. E. Graham Rogers, Director of Transportation for Prince Edward Island, estimates that vehicle traffic at Borden this year will be very close to ninety thousand automobiles, trucks, and buses as against 25,093 in 1941, and for the year 1952 on the Borden route will closely approach 300,000 persons. Railway freight has also grown enormously. Prince Edward Island as an important and essential food producing area and will very great tourist growth possibilities depends for its economic success in the future on rapid and efficient transportation. Nothing should be allowed to interfere with the fulfillment of that essential.

Dr. G. G. Houston spoke briefly on visual education and introduced Mr. Stanley McInnis, of the National Film Board, who demonstrated a new type of screen for daytime use in the schools.

Other speakers heard briefly included Miss Mabel Matheson, Mr. Frederic A. Large, chairman of the meeting, Mr. Arthur Hogan, who reported for the membership committee, and Dr. Frank Jelks, who spoke for the national magazine dealing with the work of the Association. 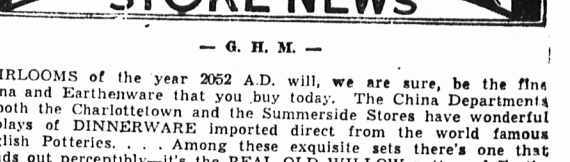
He made this one personal observation on his four-year stay in the United States: "It is very difficult for mountians to meet, but not for men."
