Tonight, with a break from old man weather, Maritime Major League hockey will return to Charlottetown with the Saint John Beavers meeting the Islanders at the Forum.

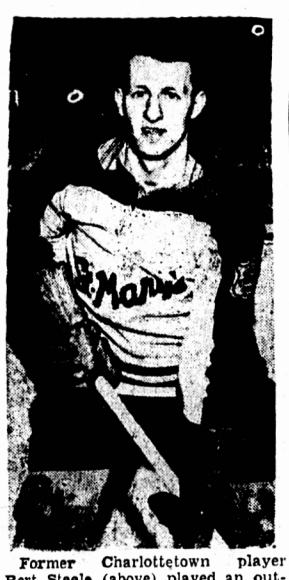

Red Wings Turn Back Chicago 3-2

DETROIT, March 3 — (CP) — Successive goals by Metro Prystal, Marty Pavelich and Red Kelly enabled Detroit Red Wings to offset a 2-0 deficit and beat Chicago Black Hawks 3-2 tonight. Detroit needs only one more victory to clinch the National Hockey League championship.

The tying and winning goals came in the final period.

The victory boosted Detroit's N.H.L. lead to 17 points over second-place Montreal.

Al Dewsbury scored late in the first period on a screened 50-footer which bounced off Terry Sawchuk's shoulder. Jimmy Peters laced in a 25-footer in the opening minutes of the second period.

Prystal started the rally shortly after, with a winning 25-foot blast after Pavelich stole the puck in the Chicago end.

Pavelich's tying corner was a 10-foot swipe at Tony Leswick's passout.

Kelly's winner came from one of the numerous scrambles in front of the Chicago goal.

Leo Reise, Detroit defenceman, was missed in the rest of the game. It was reported that he suffered severely bruised ribs.

Bout Awarded Armand Savoie

MONTEAL, March 3 — (CP) — Sandy Saddler of New York, world featherweight champion, was disqualified tonight just before the start of the fourth round of a scheduled 10-round bout with Armand Savoie, Canadian lightweight champion from Montreal.

The bout was awarded to Savoie. Referee Tommy Sullivan had cautioned Saddler about holding, hitting in the clinches and hitting with the laces of his gloves. Saddler weighed 130 1-2, Savoie, 134.

Saddler's purse in the non-title affair was ordered held up by the Montreal Athletic Commission.

Most of the fighting was at close quarters with Saddler punching continually but taking some sharp blows from Savoie in return.

Saddler was cautioned by the referee in each round, particularly in the third. Between the third and fourth rounds, president Emile Gauthier of the Montreal Athletic Commission climbed to the apron of the ring and told referee Sullivan the fight should be stopped, because of Saddler's actions.

Junior St. Mary's Win Series Opener

HALIFAX, March 3 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's defeated North Sydney Franklin Sports Club 4-3 tonight in the opening game of the best-of-five junior "A" Nova Scotia hockey finals.

St. Mary's playing close checking hockey, held off North Sydney's attempts to tie the score in a third period that saw the teams, at one time, playing with only four players each. With less than a minute of play remaining, lappers came to a head with Billy Bellick and Lorne Hennessey trading punches. It was closely followed by roughing penalties to Doug McPhee and Frank Dorrington.

The play was even with Halifax holding a slight edge in the second period. Both goalies came up with 21 stops.

Doug McPhee scored a pair and assisted on a third to pace the Saints attack with Jim Warner and Don Lovett scoring the other pair. Jackie MacLeod, Albert Gardner and Bert Dalling were the Franklin marksmen.



Skip Frank Hansen and his Prince Edward Island curlers made an auspicious start in the Dominion Curling Championships at Winnipeg yesterday. As reported elsewhere on this page the local curlers defeated Northern Ontario 8-7 in their first game of the tournament. Skip Hansen showed the way when he won the game in the last end on his last turn. Northern Ontario usually turn out some pretty fine curling teams and their defeat at the hands of the Islanders certainly reflects credit on the Island team.

The Glace Bay Miners, as well as taking their share of lickings in M. M. H. L. play this season, have dishd out lickings but yesterday they met a problem they couldn't lick when they attempted to get out of Cape Breton and play here last night. It's only about seven miles from Glace Bay to Reserve airport but the snow was piled so high on the road that it was impossible for the plows to drill their way through the banks with the result that the Miners were unable to move out of their own backyard.

The Miners were willing to try any means to get here, even thought about walking the seven miles and carrying their equipment. Forum Manager Bill Brown was in contact with "Bud" Poile several times during the day and Poile told him that he never saw so much snow in his life. At places on the road between Sydney and Glace Bay the snow is reported to be 18 feet high and last night there was word that the Government might send down blower plows from Halifax to open the highway.

The Saint John Beavers also got caught in the week-end storm. The Beavers, who played two games in Cape Breton during the latter part of last week, were still somewhere in the vicinity of Antigonish yesterday afternoon. Last night they were on the train somewhere between Antigonish and New Glasgow and were heading for Saint John by rail. The train was due in Saint John early this morning and plans were made for the Beavers to fly here today. The Beavers were slated to play a home game against Moncton last night.

Last night's postponement was the fourth for the Islanders at home this winter with three of them occurring within the last two weeks. Needless to say the club has suffered considerable loss as a result of these postponements and even though the games are replayed the houses will hardly be as large as they would had the games been played in the first place. Until recently, as far as we know, the club had been doing pretty well and those responsible for the success certainly deserve credit. The long schedule has been a tough one with so many factors working against it and there has been considerable criticizing of it but one thing that can't be taken away from the league and that is that it has succeeded in producing a lot of top-notch hockey.

On Saturday night Larry Travis scored his second goal of the season at Halifax. For Larry goals don't come too often and we were glad to see him get one at a time when he is playing some of his finest hockey of the season. Travis holds a distinction shared by very few if any others in the league in that he has played every game on the schedule to date. For the past month he has been playing a lot of the best defensive hockey in the league and although a great deal of his work goes unmentioned it doesn't go unnoticed. In his spare time Larry has his head in a chemistry, biology or history book and this is one of the reasons he gives for his ability to stand up to so much hockey.

Another pretty fair blueline better, Bill Dinning of the Sydney Millionaires, has been having a bit of tough luck lately. Last Friday night when the Mills played the Saint John Beavers Dinning lost three of his teeth. In the game at Charlottetown on the night before Bill received a gash that required five stitches to close. "Whip" Whelan, a victim of the injury jinx all year, had his wrist fractured and will be out for the rest of the season.

Sullivan suffered head and left knee injuries and Mathews a broken nose.

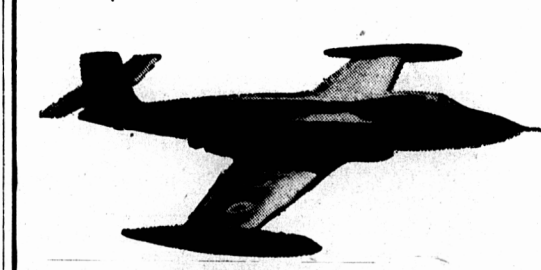
