NOTHING NEW
FROM CHINA

Russian Despatches Claim
a Victory

WON BY THE COSSACKS OVER
THE BOXERS.

Li Hung Chang Will Remain at
Canton.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, July 14.—Scanty cable despatches add nothing to the knowledge in London of the Chinese situation.

It is stated positively from Canton that Li Hung Chang will remain there until the allied troops have defeated Prince Tuan's forces and will then go north to lend his powerful aid in arranging the terms of peace, co-operating with Prince Ching Yung Lu and the other pro-foreign viceroys.

For the present Li Hung Chang considers that he can best control and direct the viceroys from Canton and also keep in check the turbulent province of Kwang Tung.

The Tien Tsin correspondent of the Express, telegraphing under date of July 9, asserts that the Chinese are daily driving in the allies.

They have mounted, says the correspondent, twelve fresh guns in advantageous positions, with which they are sweeping the streets of the foreign settlement. Intense fire is rendering position quite untenable.

The Daily Mail's St. Petersburg correspondent says that in the last six hours battle outside of Tien Tsin the Cossacks captured six Krupp guns and killed numbers of the fleeing Boxers.

The Chinese lost three thousand killed, including Gen. Keki.

MR. HALL'S ADVENTURE.

An Experience Which He is Not Likely to Forget.

Mr. I. C. Hall, of the Hotel Acadia, was the victim of an unpleasant adventure last night. About eleven o'clock a man called at the hotel and told Mr. Hall that a friend of his from the United States was in Charlottetown at one of the hotels dying and that he had been sent out to bring Mr. Hall in at the dying man's request. Mr. Hall accepted the story as true and got into the wagon with the man. On the way to town the actions of the man caused Mr. Hall to suspect him and when the man got out of the wagon and began parleying with an accomplice on the roadside. Mr. Hall whipped up the horse. But he was prevented from escaping by the other man who demanded a hundred dollars before he would allow Mr. Hall to go free. Mr. Hall could not see the point, however, and succeeded in escaping to a farm-house near by whence he came to town this morning.

Khaki and Helmets

AND THE BRITISH TROOPS
NEVER SUSPECT;

Details of the Losses at Nitral's
Nek

LONDON, July 14.—Lord Roberts has sent nothing further concerning the Nitral Nek affair. Pretoria despatches, however, show that the Lincolnshires lost half of their officers, including Colonel Roberts, who was wounded and taken prisoner.

Stragglers continue to arrive at camp but few further details can be gathered. The British fought stubbornly until night-fall, when the cavalry turned their horses loose.

Boer reports of the engagement place the British casualties at over 200.

In the Derdepoort affair, mentioned in Lord Roberts' despatch, the men in the front rank of the Boers were in khaki uniforms and helmets and the Dragoons passed them unsuspectingly, under the impression that they were Hussars.

The mistake was not discovered until the Boers opened a heavy fire when the Dragoons were within 400 yards.

The British prisoners who have escaped at Kransdorp report that Dewet's force of 10,000 men with ten guns, expelled from Beilehem by Clements and Paget, have taken up a strong position fifteen miles to the southward in the hills around Reteif Nek.

Steyn is reported to be with them.

Another case of the Boers wearing khaki is reported to have happened at Lindley on June 26, when they surprised a picket of 25 men of the Yorkshire Light Infantry, 18 of whom were killed or wounded.

They Won't Believe it.

LONDON, July 12.—The Times Shanghai correspondent says that Emperor William's offer of a reward of 1,000 taels for every foreigner rescued from Pekin has been published in Shanghai, where the natives read it with general incredulity.
