WOMAN'S CHAT.

Joie About a Few of the Fancies of the Hour.

The proper treatment of silk stockings and silk and lace requires that they should not be worn two days in succession. When taken off they should be shaken free of dust, turned inside out and hung in a current of air. This will reduce the number of washings necessary to clean them. They should be washed in warm, but not hot, suds, made with white castile soap and rinsed in warm water. They should be wrung gently, stretched and dried, but they should not be ironed.

Cushion For Hat Pins.

Milliner's pins are among those necessary accessories of the toilet which one scarcely knows what to do with and cannot do without. The ordinary pin-cushion is no solution of the difficulty and the pin-tray is no better unless it is an oversize affair. A pretty cushion expressly for these large, ungainly, but particularly useful pins, is a sizable egg-shaped pad covered with cream-tinted moiré cloth. This pad is outlined with heavy twist in any color desired, and is then draped with lace about the edge. It is a hanging cushion, and where the loop by which it is suspended is fastened at the sides are bows the color of the twist with which the cushion is outlined.

Soufflé for a Brunette.

A novelty specially suitable for a brunette is a soufflé in deep ripe, corn-colored tulle. Inside it is a mass of tiny fruits of satin-edged lisse, white outside there are three deep flounces of silk embroidered blonde, with a narrow, thin band of small scarlet Alpine poppies heading each ruche. Another hair ornament is of more silk, veiled with blonde triangles in silk moiré, and crossed star fashion, with radiated row of gathered ruffling pinked out at the edges, in keeping with the flounce drooping all around. This was a very stock enhanced with gold top anklets, or it may be incrustated with stones.

The Paper Wedding.

The paper wedding, which may be observed on the second anniversary of one's marriage, can now be made a very charming fête. At one not long ago the bride and guests wore dresses and flowers of paper, the house was decorated with most various paper flowers and napkins were of paper. The guests were requested to come without gifts but if one will it otherwise so many beautiful things can be fashioned out of a little crepe paper that it is no grievous tax on one's fingers. Lamp shades, articles for the dressing table and late spreads are pretty gifts. Choice photographs, etchings, books and a subscription for a magazine would give a more enduring pleasure at no very great outlay.
