

Death Follows Denial Of Blood Transfusions

ENGLHART, Ont. (CP)—Denied vital blood transfusions by religious principles, a young mother of five children died Monday of internal bleeding.

Mrs. James Grant, 29-year-old farm wife and a Jehovah's Witness, refused to accept a blood transfusion after a car crash Sunday night. Her husband, also injured in the crash, said he could not violate his religious tenets unless his spiritual leader approved.

Farmer Lionel Anyan, Witness leader in this community near Kirkland Lake, was urged by a sister and the mother of the severely injured woman to permit a transfusion. He declined.

"I cannot go against my faith," he told Mrs. Clara Rock, the woman's mother.

"Do it for my sake then, and the sake of the children," said Mrs. Rock. She said Mr. Anyan replied:

"They will be taken care of. I cannot give my permission." An inquest will be held Wednesday.

Mr. Anyan told reporters he made his decision on the basis of the Biblical admonition, "Ye shall eat no manner of blood." Leviticus :28

He said:

"It was a wonderful decision for her to make. She realized that if she were to save her life with a blood transfusion, then should lose her life at Armageddon."

Mrs. Grant's sister, Mrs. T. J. Brown, said a hospital doctor told her the injured woman "could have been saved by blood transfusions."

Mr. and Mrs. Grant were returning from a Jehovah's Witness prayer meeting in Englehart when their car collided head-on with a truck.

Truck driver Roger Hameln, 16, and his passenger, Wayne Holland, 16, escaped with minor injuries.

Dam At Montague Reduces Fire Risk

A new water dam located at north end of Montague will reduce fire risk in the area.

The dam, built of rock and clay fill, is approximately 40 feet long and 20 feet wide with a by-pass at high water level. A head of about five feet has been provided, and the dam runs back about 75 yards. This project has provided sufficient water in the area for any fire which might occur.

Since the site is also a lovely one, it is possible that, should permission be obtained roadside tables may be placed along both banks for tourist travelling accommodation, and this matter is at the present time being given some consideration.
