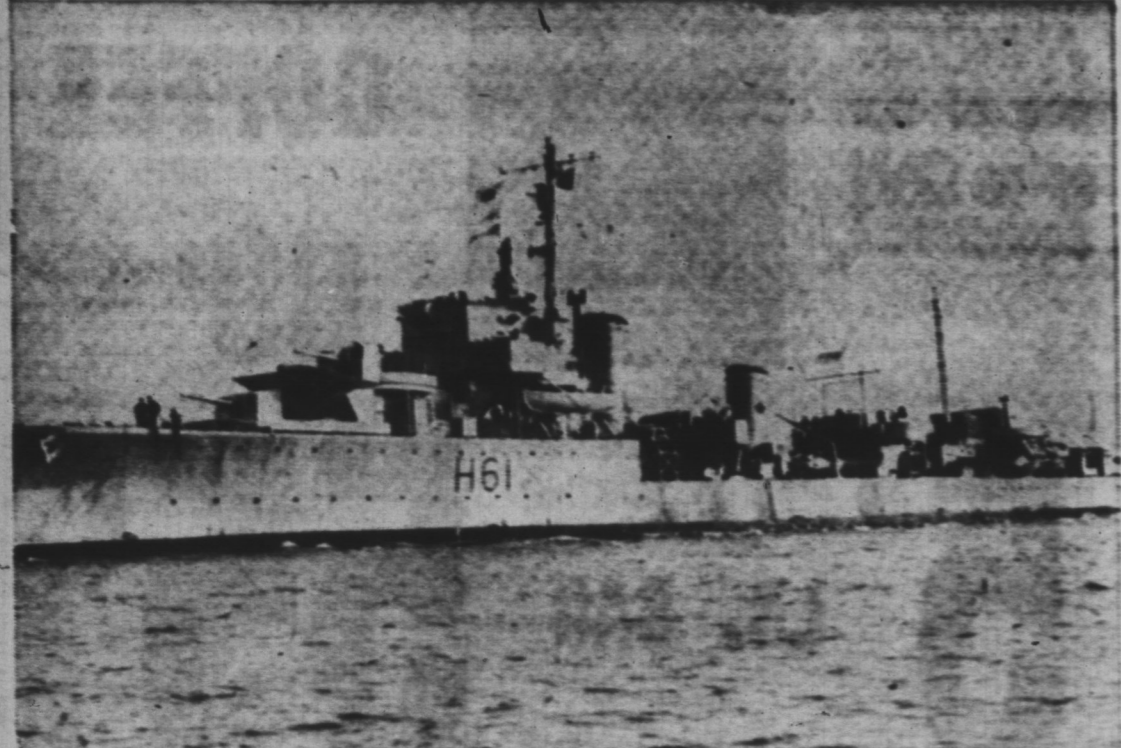

She was declared surplus in March, 1947, was sold and broken up.

# Tariff Hike On Fabrics From U.S. Recommended

OTTAWA (CP)—The Tariff Board has recommended a 15-per-cent boost in duties on United States fabrics as part of a major overhaul of Canada's cottons tariff structure covering an import business totalling about \$150,000,000 a year.

Finance Minister Fleming, in tabling the board's two-volume report in the Commons Wednesday, indicated the government plans some action on the recommendations, product of 46 days of public hearings and months of board investigations.

However, opening of negotiations with the U.S. and other countries involved may be delayed until the board completes studies of other aspects of the textiles structure, including synthetics.

Mr. Fleming said that the board's proposals are "small in size" and that they might involve the further reports which he hopes to receive later this year from the board on textiles.

Rejected was the Canadian industry's appeal for special protection against imports from low-wage countries, such as India and Japan. The industry apparently had in mind such things as special import quotas, but the board said under its terms of reference it could deal only with tariff changes.

Rejected also was various new terminology suggested by the industry which the board found would be too complicated and confusing to customs appraisers. But the industry did win a major concession in the board's decision to reduce the number of cottons items in the tariff to 20 from 50 and to change rates to a straight percentage of value. The board found that protection from existing compound rates of percentage of value and fixed cent-per-pound has been eroded by rising prices.
