Membership In The I. O. D. E. Is High; Budget For Deficit

VANCOUVER (CP) — Fourteen new chapters formed in 1956 bring the current total to 977, members of the Imperial-Order Daughters of the Empire were told at the opening session today of their annual meeting.

Mrs. G. D. Leggett of Toronto, national organizing secretary, noted that this actually is a net increase of six chapters, because in the same period seven senior and one junior chapter disbanded. Total membership now is 11,403.

More than 500 introduction cards had been sent out among members moving from one province to another during the year, she said. She also disclosed that total membership of the IODE on the island of Bermuda is 354, including 16 new members.

Despite all efforts to curtail expenses, Mrs. P. M. L. Robinson, national treasurer, also of Toronto, reported a deficit of \$1,060 in the general operating fund. "The finance committee has again budgeted for a deficit for 1957 due to the continual increase in expense," she added.

Suggesting that the raising of fees be considered, Mrs. Robinson said "an organization as large as the IODE should not repeatedly show greater expenditures than revenues."

Eleven primary chapters have come under the anticommittee in Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and the Yukon Territories, aid national secretaries, D. W. McGibbon, Toronto. She added that these chapters work not only for IODE projects but also local community projects.

"Since the resolution was passed last year that the order would continue to support the Canadian association of consumers," Mrs. McGibbon said, "the CAC now is represented in the Yukon."

Mrs. Hugh L. Allward, national hospitality convener, of York Mills, Ont., reported that Hungarian refugees, new Canadians, senior citizens, exchange and Colombo Plan students, D.V.A. veterans and handicapped persons received hospitality and aid throughout the year from members across the Dominion.

She stressed that service had been extended to new Canadians at the port of entry. Assistance also had been given by the IODE to the Students Club in London, England.

National publicity convener Mrs. John Mills, Toronto, reported that publicity for the IODE has been outstanding during the year, indicating the importance and influence of chapter activities.
