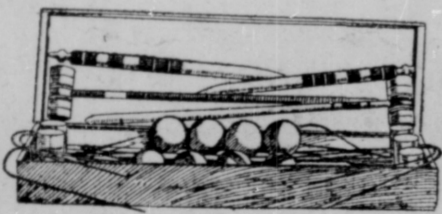

## PRESIDENT KRUGER WAS OBSTINATE

### And Has Caused a Serious Situation

THE INTERVIEW WITH HIM WAS VERY UNSATISFACTORY

He Stubbornly Refused all Concessions.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, June 8.—The Exchange Telegraph publishes an interview with the Permanent Secretary of the Colonial Office in which he is quoted as declaring that the conference at Bloemfontain, in the Orange Free State, between President Kruger, of the Transvaal Republic, and the British High Commissioner, Sir Alfred Milner, was preeminently unsatisfactory, and that there is no probability of its resumption.

A report was received from Sir Alfred Milner, stating that President Kruger obstinately refused any concessions tending towards the settlement of the Transvaal difficulty.

After reading the despatch, Mr. Chamberlain, Lord Selbourne, and others held a consultation concerning the failure of the negotiations which may create a serious situation.

### No Decision has Yet Been Arrived at.

The Company's Action Regarded as a Violation of Agreement.

OTTAWA, June 8.—The House of Commons, in committee, sat until 3.30 this morning and rose without coming to a decision of the Drummond Bill.

In the afternoon the Grand Trunk strike was brought up.

Powell and Taylor gave an account of their interview with General Manager Hays, both stating emphatically that Hays agreed to take all the men back and negotiate the subject of wages afterwards. They regard the refusal of the company to take the men back as a distinct violation of the agreement.

## THE FRENCH SHORE QUESTION

### May Now be Brought to a Climax

A FRENCH COMMODORE GOING TO INVESTIGATE

The Cause of the Burning of a French Factory

SYDNEY, June 8.—The French cruisers Seley and Froade, in command of Commodore Henrique, will leave here for Newfoundland in a few days to investigate the cause of recent fire which ruined the largest lobster factory on the French Shore.

The Commodore has been informed of the identity of the incendiary. He is a native of Newfoundland and lived about forty miles from the burned factory and says he did the deed at the instigation of merchants in Newfoundland.

Commodore Henrique, feels very deeply on the subject and will seek indemnity from the Newfoundland government. Punishment of the crime will not he says satisfy his government.

### Have Reached a Practical Agreement
