

Maglie And Ford To Start In World Series Today

BROOKLYN (AP)—Sal Maglie, Brooklyn's 39-year-old "comeback kid," faces Whitley Ford, New York Yankee's lefthanded ace, in the opener of the seventh Dodger-Yankee world series today at Ebbets Field with President Eisenhower in a box near the home dugout.

Although the Yankees were beaten by the Dodgers last fall in seven games and must play the first two games in enemy territory, the oddsmakers rate the American League champions 3 to 2 favorites to win the best-of-seven series. The opener is 6 to 5 and take your pick.

Fair weather with temperatures around 65 was forecast for game time at 1 p.m. ADT with a crowd of between 34,000 and 36,000 in the ancient stands. The game will be broadcast and televised over the CBC network.

President Eisenhower Will Attend World Series Opener

BROOKLYN (AP) — When the president of the United States attends a world series game, it calls for a lot of extra doing.

The box seat layout had to be revised for President Eisenhower's visit to Ebbets Field today. The chief executive, with a party of 12, will sit near the Brooklyn dugout and will toss out the first ball.

He will arrive at 11:35 a.m. EST — 25 minutes before the start — like a true fan, so he can witness the final warmups.

Twenty secret service men will be spotted — unrecognizable — at various key spots.

The last president to attend a world series game was the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, who watched the Yankees beat the Giants at the Polo Grounds in 1936.

"I remember I caught Hank Leiber's fly for the final out," Joe DiMaggio recalls. "I ran up the steps to the dressing room, only to find it locked. I just had to stand there with the ball in my hand. Nobody could leave the park until the president had made his exit."

The city will have 500 uniformed policemen on hand around the ball park to direct traffic, watch pickpockets and keep order.
