House of Commons.

THE RE-DISTRIBUTION BILL. An Exciting Debate.

OTTAWA, June 18.

The House yesterday sat in committee on the Re-distribution Bill, Charlton talked against it. Coming down to the popular vote he went on to say that it was largely in favor of the Liberals in Ontario.

Mr. Wallace—(D) I understand the hon. gentleman to say that the Liberals had the popular majority in Ontario at last election. Sir Richard Cartwright—At the general election of 1891 the reform majority in Ontario was 7,200 odd, according to the official statement of George Johnson, Dominion statistician.

Mr. Wallace—I say that Johnson never made any such official statement. Cartwright—Yes, and I got it sent to me and other members as well.

Wallace—He knows that he cannot produce it. Cartwright—The hon. gentleman has no right to say so. I am stating what I know to have been placed in my hands.

Wallace—There was never any statement of the kind. Cartwright—There was, and it was given in detail.

Wallace—I challenge him to produce it. Cartwright—I don't carry these statements with me. I said that I know the statement was given, but the hon. gentleman is unworthy my further notice.

Wallace—I can tell the hon. gentleman I had not to go over the whole country looking for a constituency. Cartwright—I don't think the hon. gentleman is likely to get any other constituency.

Sir John Thompson—He, (Wallace) never had to write the hands of weeping constituents who had to vote for him.

Cartwright—I never had a clerical friend at my back who told me that I should be elected because I plundered the country best.

Sir John Thompson—The hon. gentleman had never any respectable element in this country at his back.

Cartwright—I can tell the Minister of Justice that I do not call it respectable backing—the recommendation of me to my constituents that I am a good plunderer.

The spot continued between Cartwright and Wallace for some time.

The chairman called the former to order several times, and being finally asked to give his ruling, Mr. Bergeron, who was in the chair, decided that both were out of order, and that they should pair (roars of laughter).

After recess, Charlton continued the debate; Edgar followed.

A Convict Pardoned.

Arthur Armondale, a life prisoner in Dorchester Penitentiary for shooting two children at Annapolis twelve years ago, has been pardoned by the Governor-General. He immediately left for the States.
