FRANK TRAINOR

Thursday morning, January 15th brought death to Frank Trainor and loss and deep sorrow to all who knew him.

Born in 1864, his life in its entirety, except for a sojourn of a few years spent in Port Augustus, was spent in Donagh, the place of his birth.

Island Odds And Ends

The number of people drawing weekly Unemployment Insurance benefit checks through the Charlottetown National Employment Office is slightly over seventeen hundred. The figure has varied only very little in the past three weeks. In terms of money it is roughly estimated that between \$20,000 and \$25,000 is being paid out every seven days.

The National Employment Office in Summerside pays all benefit claims in Prince County, and at the present time is understood to have a total of approximately one thousand people entitled to weekly cheques. The combined figures for both offices, Charlottetown and Summerside, is well over 2500, and the amount of money disbursed weekly well over \$30,000.

There has been quite a change in the condition of Charlottetown streets since last spring. Either because of old age or the wear and tear of trucks, bulldozers and machines equipped with caterpillar treads, the City's highways literally crumbled to rubble in many places during the winter of 1952. Citizens who motored bumpy over the damaged thoroughfares felt, as well as saw the extensive damage. Many predicted that it would be years before the streets were repaired. Fortunately the City Council,

correctly gauging the wishes of the public, courageously undertook an extensive program of reconstruction and resurfacing, and by autumn the townfolk were expressing appreciation. On the whole the reconditioned streets have come through the winter very well, but a few have shown signs of quick deterioration.

Those in which defects have developed will be repaired this spring. The contractors—according to City manager James F. Fullerton, will be back when the weather permits, to complete unfinished work and to deal with previous work which has proved unsatisfactory. It is understood the City Council withheld some thousands of dollars of the contract price, until the durability of the new streets could be tested.

Our fellow citizen "Buck" Whitlock is being honored tonight for his great contribution to hockey. His career on the ice has been noteworthy and brought his native province much desirable publicity. On the diamond as on the ice he has entertained thousands of people, and been responsible for many a thrill, winter and summer. In war and in peace, at work or at play he has been a good citizen, which is probably the greatest tribute which can be paid him.
