NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The public accounts, as given to the public, are not easily understood; but one thing is certain, viz., increased taxation.

When the Legislature was re-elected we supposed that the expenses of the Government would also have been reduced; but they have been increased.

"McClure's Magazine" for April is at hand. It contains the continuation of the Life of Lincoln, Anthony Hope's new novel, an interesting description of the methods adopted in the "new" method of photography and other articles which bring it fully up to its own high standard.

It is related that Joe Martin, single-handed, fought the Government for twelve hours in the Hudson Bay canal bill. Such is the character of the obstruction that is now offered to the passage of the Remedial Bill.

The Manitoba commission is a test of Mr. Laurier's energy. It should fail of its conciliatory purpose then nine tenths of Mr. Laurier's oration, the greatest and most powerful and brilliant ever delivered by any statesman in any Parliament in any country (save the Globe), falls to the ground with a sickening thud.

The Marquis of Salisbury has gone to Reading. The census of Manitoba to be taken immediately.

Upwards of 2,000 marriages were performed in Nova Scotia last year. One hundred houses were destroyed by fire at Panama, Columbia, one day last week.

There were 13 deaths caused by an explosion of mine dust at Daboite, Pa., last week. The matches of the Inezeta and Fili-bust districts have revolted and massacred the white settlers.

During a labor riot in Indianapolis, last week, several pistol shots were fired, and two men were wounded.

Andover, Mass., will celebrate its 250th anniversary on the 20th of May next. The town has voted \$1,500 to defray expenses.

Tarte, Mr. Beaulieu's political rival, says Sir Oliver Mowat is going to help him dip his little into the Ottawa soup.

In London the belief prevails that early in the new year the Prince of Wales' resignation of the post of Governor-General was engaged to a well-known English nobleman.

Nicola Tesla, electrician and scientist, is working on tests with the end in view of signaling the planet Mars by electric waves, which he believes perfectly practical.

The successor of the Springdale (Ark.) Times is called the Catholic Bay. It is published by J. C. Massie, who is certainly up to date in naming his newspaper.

The legislature of Ohio has passed a bill prohibiting women from wearing high hat in theatres. Some middlemen people will be drafting laws regulating the size of sleeves next.

A herd of 45 elephants in the Barnum menagerie was recently thrown into such terror by the appearance of a rat, that double chains had to be put upon them to keep them from breaking away.

William E. Bragdon, a machinist of Salem, died last Wednesday night, as the result of picking a pimple on his nose. The cause was an insignificant ailment until Bragdon picked it with his finger-nails, when blood poisoning set in.

At Dover, Mass., on Wednesday, the body of Edward McGrath was found in a rowboat, which was frozen in the ice. He carried a man across the river the night before, and it is thought death resulted from exhaustion.

The skeleton of William Davies, the pack peddler, who was murdered for his money in Hartland, was unearthed in a cellar that was last week. Davies called upon to sing the song about ten years ago, and was never heard of him.

Capt. Thomas Phelan, of Kansas City, Mo., expert broadswordman and identified with Irish revolutionary movements, has issued a challenge to a rival combatant in the United States.

A tumor of remarkable size, weighing just under a hundred pounds, has recently been removed from an old lady at the Bangor General Hospital. Three days after the operation she was well enough to sit up, and she insists that she has felt neither pain nor discomfort since she took the ether.

The London papers reported Mr. Gladstone as "hard as nails" on his return the other day from the continent. As one of them expressed it, "he leaped out of the saloon on to the 'Sharing Cross' platform with all the agility of a man who has a continuous journey of twenty-six hours as nothing."

Now the Matabele in South Africa are in arms and giving trouble to the British settlers. With the Boers in one place, the Derivishes in another, and Lobengwele's men in a third, all in angry mood, Great Britain has another illustration that in Africa, as in other places, war is not so much a thing as it used to be.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

The Manitoba Remedial Bill.

A Long and Lively Sitting. The Government Determined to Press Forward.

OTTAWA, April 1. The House went into committee yesterday on the Remedial Bill, Mr. Bergeron in the chair.

In reply to Mr. Davies Sir Charles Tupper said that it was highly important that the bill should be proceeded with from day to day, owing to the short time remaining for Parliament.

Mr. Davies proceeded to criticize the action of the Government in continuing to press the bill, when—

Hon. Mr. Quinn rose to a point of order. He thought that the discussion should be confined to first class and not to the general policy of the Government.

Mr. Mills claimed that Parliament had no power to proceed with a bill of this kind, except as a point of last resort.

He was proceeding to elaborate his point when the chairman gave his decision on Mr. Quinn's point of order, that the discussion must be confined to the clause.

Mr. McNeill thereupon rose to express his regret that the discussion was shut off. The discussion of the clause was then taken up.

THE MANITOBA QUESTION. Failure of the Negotiations. Great Regret Expressed at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, April 1. From Sir Charles Tupper's statement in the House yesterday confirmed from private telegrams from Winnipeg, it is evident that the Dominion commissioners and provincial authorities of Manitoba have failed to come to terms.

It is alleged that the province was willing to meet the views of the minority in regard to the question of religious teaching, etc., in the schools so far as it was possible to do so, without granting purely local schools. In this regard there was every prospect of a satisfactory settlement, but the province would only agree to this on condition that the remedial legislation at Ottawa should be withdrawn.

It is said that the commissioners leave for Ottawa to-day. Great regret is expressed here at the apparent failure of the negotiations. The House will not sit on Good Friday.
