

# Liquidation Of "Shako" Dealers And Bootleggers Demanded By Grand Jury

Stronger action against shako dealers and bootleggers was recommended in the Supreme Court by the Grand Jury when they suggested in their report yesterday that the Mounted Police be directed to make more intensive efforts to "liquidate" such offenders.

In addition the jury felt that drunken driving should be more severely dealt with.

Generally speaking the Grand Jury expressed satisfaction with conditions as they found them in the various public institutions they visited as part of their duties. Some recommendations for additions or improvements to existing facilities were made.

Following is the report presented:

"We, the Grand Jury duly impanelled for this term of the sitting of the Supreme Court, wish to report as follows:—

"That we go on record that we as a Grand Jury make the suggestion that all visits to the various institutions be discontinued unless some of the suggestions of said Jury be carried out.

"JAIL: We found the jail under the management of Mr. Lloyd Simpson in fairly good condition and inmates well cared for. At the present time 29 prisoners confined in this jail. The floor of toilet and hall need new cement or tile. Considering the obsolete building Mr. Simpson deserves great praise.

"FALCONWOOD: Buildings are clean and sanitary under the management of Mr. Montgomery. We

recommend a new water softener be supplied as soon as possible and a suggestion is offered about an elevator for the men's quarters. This is badly needed in case of fire. The kitchen needs floor tiling and a lift for the food to the first floor. A compound is needed for the male patients.

Number of patients: Male Division 153; female division 138.

"The farming operations and general appearance of the live stock reflect great credit on the farm manager, Mr. Unsworth Gurney.

"INFIRMARY: Mrs. Garrick has the building in an excellent condition as far as cleanliness is concerned. Floor covering is badly needed, and the laundry is obsolete for the work to be done. We find 163 patients in a building designed for 75 beds. Food served is of good quality.

"BEACH GROVE INN: We find the institution under the very capable management of Mr. Harry Bonnell and everything in the building in an excellent condition. We cannot speak too highly of the way this building is being run.

"There are at present 140 patients. Food served is very satisfactory.

"We recommend that drunken driving be more severely dealt with, also that the Mounted Police be directed to make more intensive efforts to liquidate shako dealers and bootleggers.
