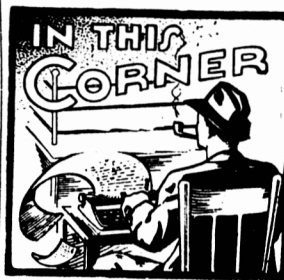

Tonight at midnight the deadline for bringing professional hockey players into the league will be reached. During the past several days coach Leo Lamoureux has been in contact with at least six minor league clubs. He can secure the services of one player whose status must be cleared by the M. A. H. A. before he can be allowed to play here and has one or two other possibilities. "I hope to land one player by tonight," stated Leo. He would like to get two or three men but financial conditions being what they are will be glad to settle for one.

Meanwhile Halifax, the City into which hockey players arrive on nearly every other train and from which none ever seem to leave, are trying to bring in three more players. This should bring the number of players which Halifax has used this year close to the forty mark. Apparently Col. Oland and Wilf Fields are leaving no stones unturned in their efforts to give Halifax its first Maritime Major Hockey crown.

Last night a Halifax sportscaster revealed that the attendance at the Saints home games this season had passed the 100,000 mark on Wednesday night. This worked out to better than 3,500 paying customers a game, he pointed out. Questioned about the paid admissions at the Islanders games, Forum Manager Bill Brown stated late last night that he did not have the figures available. Until a month ago the admissions averaged 2,340 but since then have dropped due to the Christmas holidays and poor weather.

Coach Lamoureux stated last night that he never punched referee Mathieu in Saint John on Wednesday night. "We were arguing and I gave him a push," stated Leo. The argument was caused when the referee differed over an icing the puck ruling. Referee Larry Heffering signed that the puck was iced but Mathieu overruled his fellow official and the Beavers scored on the play. Lamoureux called Heffering over to talk to him and shortly after Mathieu skated over to where the discussion was taking place. The shoving incident and Lamoureux's eviction soon followed.

The Beavers were hot in the first period, reported Leo. "They were playing as well as they did any time this season." He mentioned the work of Ray Frederick in the Islanders goal, who played a strong game. The Islanders' bus broke down between Saint John and Moncton on the way home and it was not until six o'clock yesterday morning that the Islanders got to Moncton. They came over on the noon flight and accompanying them was Hal Gordon, the man who shut them out the night before.

Defenceman George McLagan will return to action tonight after being sidelined for several days with the flu. This will give the Islanders four defencemen and nine forwards for tonight's important game with the Beavers. Johnny Dutchak was released from hospital yesterday but will still be out for another ten days, reported his physician Dr. Laidlaw last night.

Actually had it not been for his older brother Johnny Dutchak would have been out of hockey for good in 1946. That was the year following the war when Johnny was a pilot in the R.C.A.F. and he had returned to school in Edmonton. The brother was playing with the Edmonton Flyers and asked Johnny to come up to practice. The younger Dutchak, wanting the exercise, turned out and made the team as a forward. In his first game Johnny scored two goals. The Flyers promptly presented him with a contract and started him at the handsome salary of \$40 a week. His salary increased as the weeks went by.

This morning the Saint Dunstan's University basketball team will leave for Chatham, New Brunswick where they will meet St. Thomas in an intercollegiate game tonight. It will be the Saints' first road trip as a basketball team in senior intercollegiate play. Tomorrow night they meet the powerful University of New Brunswick quintet at Fredericton.

In their only intercollegiate start the Saints tonight in the Tommies last Friday night in the S. D. U. gym. Rookie Dickie Moore picked up a loose puck at centre, crossed the New York blue-line and shoved a short pass to Richard. The Rocket drove a hard, low shot past goalie Chuck Rayner.

The Montreal victory put Canadiens only half a game behind the second-place Toronto Maple Leafs in the National Hockey League standings.

QUEBEC, Jan. 31 (CP) — Detroit Red Wings, hottest team in the National Hockey League, tonight slaughtered Quebec Aces of the Quebec Senior League 7-1 in an exhibition game before 12,000 fans, but at least one Quebec player put up some fighting.

The game was to open a \$285,000 fund campaign for the Federation of Roman Catholic Charities, Quebec City branch, and Detroit agreed to come down with only their transportation and other expenses paid.

Terry Sawchuk, with 10 N.H.L. shutouts to his credit, blocked all but one of the Quebec offerings. The Wings had a narrow 29-26 edge in play.

## Bruins-Black Hawks Battle To Scoreless Draw

CHICAGO, Jan. 31 (CP) — Boston Bruins took over undisputed fourth place in the National Hockey League tonight by playing a scoreless tie with Chicago Black Hawks before 3,218 fans, an all-time low attendance for hockey in Chicago.

It was the second scoreless deadlock for the Bruins who played Detroit, 0-0, on Nov. 6.

Tonight's game was leisurely at times with only spurts of swift, offensive effort by the two teams.

The closest approach to a goal came not long after the halfway point of the third period. Woody Dumart's ran past goalie Harry Lumley was disallowed because rookie defenceman Jack McIntyre was in the crease when it occurred.

Otherwise, it was a safe, sane exhibition with only four penalties called, two to a side. Lumley had 22 saves to 25 for Boston's Jim Henry.

## Sea-Fish Landings

OTTAWA, Jan. 31 (CP) — Landings of sea-fish in Canada during 1951 declined more than three per cent from the preceding year but there was a gain of seven per cent in landed value, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The year's catch amounted to 1,291,738,000 pounds valued at \$72,660,000 compared with 1,335,696,000 at \$67,730,000 in 1950.

Catch on the Pacific Coast during 1951 declined to 595,758,000 pounds from 606,419,000, but the value rose to \$40,214,000 from \$35,402,000. Landings of all species of fish on the Atlantic Coast were down to 695,975,000 pounds from 728,277,000, but the value also was slightly higher at \$32,446,000 against \$32,328,000.
