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Freighter To Load Pulpwood At Summerside

The S. S. Mica out of Bergen, Norway, docked at the Marine Wharf in Summerside on Monday afternoon to load 1500 cords of pulpwood for Rouen, France. This cargo is being loaded by the P. E. I. Produce Co.

It is understood that 1000 cords of pulpwood had to be brought to Summerside by rail from Eastern King's County because the dock at the normal loading point was under construction. The remaining 500 cords will be loaded from stock piles in Prince County. Loading operations are expected to be completed by Saturday.

The S. S. Mica, under command of Captain A. B. Larsen, is loading cargo from P. E. I. for the first time. A new ship, built in Italy and placed in service only four years ago, she is equipped with every possible aid to navigation.

The Mica, the largest ship to dock at Summerside so far this season, is 305 feet long, has a draft of 43 feet, a gross tonnage of 2481, and carries a crew of 26. She came here from Montreal where she had carried a cargo of cement from Antwerp—S.
