NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN NEWS.

BELLEVEILLE, May 12.

The first regular train over the North Hastings Railway left for Madoc to-day, at 3 p. m.

Capt. Crozier, of the North-West Mounted Police, left in charge of 80 recruits for the force.

HAMILTON, May 12.

Yesterday morning Frank Clarkson, aged 42, traveller for Hyslop, Russell & Co., of this city, dropped dead at the Dominion Hotel, of heart disease.

MONTREAL, May 12.

The Government Veterinary Surgeon here last week inspected 1,543 cattle for shipment to England.

GRANBY, Que., May 12.

A fire to night destroyed the saw mill belonging to S. H. Miner, together with some thousands of joists. The fire is still raging.

WINDSOR, May 12.

Yesterday evening an eight year old son of G. Delineau fell into a large tank containing hot water, and was so severely scalded that his death ensued this morning.

DUBLIN, Ont., May 12.

As Mrs. McFaul, of Staffa, was driving home from Exeter, her horse took fright and ran away, throwing her out of the buggy and killing her instantly. Her three year old daughter, who was with her at the time, was also thrown out and so seriously injured that but slight hopes are entertained.

UNITED STATES.

PITTSBURG, May 12.

Mountain fires around here are raging. A large amount of lumber and R. R. ties have been destroyed. The Ladin Powder Mills are threatened and many men are fighting the flames. At Moose, where other powder mills are located, every effort is being made to save the buildings. Unless it rains soon, the destruction of property will be enormous.

NEW YORK, May 12.

Says the *World*:—The steamship *Andes*, fresh from seaport cities of the West Indies, in two of which yellow fever is epidemic, is on the way to New York. It is feared the plague may at any time in the next month or two make its appearance at some point much nearer this city than is desirable.

PORT JARVIS, N. Y., May 12.

Forest fires are spreading and destroying vast amounts of lumber in the North-West part of Pike County, Pennsylvania.

SPORTING NEWS.

NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, May 12.

Odds of two to one on Hanlan are still plentifully forthcoming. Elliott is practising hard.

Hanlan is still in Scotland, and is not expected to return to Newcastle before the end of the week.

Elliott was out twice this morning and had a light trial with Feeley, of Barrow-in-Furness. Elliott, at only 32 strokes to the minute rowed steadily away from Feeley.

ENGLAND'S WARS.

GUNDMUK, May 10.

At his first formal interview with Yacoob Khan, Major Cavagnari presented a letter from the Viceroy of India accrediting him as negotiator. The letter is unimportant, as it is addressed to the Ameer, thereby acknowledging Yacoob Khan as the *de facto* ruler of Afghanistan.

LONDON, May 12.

A despatch from Simon Bay, Cape Good Hope, dated April 28th, says no fresh fighting has taken place lately. Lord Chelmsford and Louis Napoleon have gone to Kambula.

Nuguevanda, Cetawayo's youngest brother has surrendered. The death of Umbeline, one of the King's brothers, is confirmed. News from Transvaal is encouraging. The Boers have broken camp and are returning home.

ROME.

At a Consistory held to-day, the Pope appointed five Cardinal priests and three Cardinal deacons. Among the new Cardinals are the Rev. Jno. Henry Newman, of England, and Rev. Dr. Herzenrotter. The Pope also made several appointments to Bishops, and amongst those are Cardinal Hohenlobe to the Bishopric of Albano, Rev. Dr. McCabe to that of Dublin, and Rev. Dr. Woodloch to that of Ardagh and Cloughmaynoise.

RUSSIA.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 12.

Intelligence has been received from Lifits that a disease, of terrible mortality, is raging in ten villages in the Caucasus. A solemn procession of holy pictures has been held in the district of Goriand. Prayers were offered for the preservation of the inhabitants.

BELIN, May 12.

Political murders in Russia have been recently confined to the Provinces. The stringent measures adopted against them seemed to have cowed the conspirators.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 12.

The Czar declared that prisoners tried by Court Martial must be doomed or acquitted within 24 hours, and sentences must be executed within 24 hours from the time they are pronounced.
