Keel Is Laid For Coal Ship

ST. CATHARINES, Ont. (CP)—Premier Robarts of Ontario today announced the laying of the keel of a 680-foot self-unloading vessel designed to carry Nova Scotia coal to Toronto.

The vessel is one of two to be constructed. Both are expected to cost \$20,000,000 over a period of 2½ years. The construction contract was awarded to a \$25,000,000 contract for Nova Scotia coal signed by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and the Dominion Coal Company.

Titan II Blows In Mid-Flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—A Titan II intercontinental ballistic missile exploded spectacularly in flight Wednesday high above the Atlantic Ocean.

It was the first blowup of a Titan II missile in 16 test launches and marked the first time that failure occurred during first-stage flight of the missile. Six previous failures were traced to second-stage problems.

The explosion was another setback for Titan II's development as the most-powerful U.S. military rocket and as the booster for the two-man Gemini spacecraft. First manned Gemini flights are scheduled later next year.

Mortgage Loans Reported Sold

OTTAWA (CP)—Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation announced Wednesday that its latest offering of non-insured mortgage loans valued at \$35,000,000 has been completely sold to investors.

The offering drew the largest number of bids of the eight offered thus far in a series designed to establish an active market in mortgages.

The eight offerings brings the value of CMHC-held mortgages sold in this manner to \$148,250,000.

Copter Flight Stopped By Fog

GOOSE BAY, Labrador (CP)—A United States Air Force turbine helicopter, bound for Frobisher on Halifax Island, was forced to land at Safeke near the northern tip of Labrador Wednesday.

A spokesman for the United States Air Force declined to say what forced the helicopter to land at the isolated northern Labrador community about half way between here and Frobisher at 2:15 p.m. ADT.

Sugar Prices Predicted Sliding To Starting Point

NEW YORK (AP)—A sugar price skyrocket turned downward Wednesday, a United States government official predicted it will plunge back where it started.

Trade sources debated whether prices will fall as fast or as far as they rose but agreed that a major change would be made by a fresh review, however, probably will not super affect for several days.

A U.S. supermarket representative declared: "We don't see a sugar shortage being caught up with the rise yet."

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New Forest Fires Break Out In N.S.

HALIFAX (CP)—Several new fires broke out in Nova Scotia's dry woodlands Wednesday and the prospects for relief from rain were only fleeting.

Firefighters, assisted by water supplies from rail tank cars and from a water bombing plane, were holding an outbreak at Wilkin Lake on the Queens-Lantern Bay County border of Nova Scotia late Wednesday afternoon. The blaze which broke out Tuesday afternoon raged over close to 200 acres of scrub and young spruce.

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Near Tantallon in Halifax County fire raged over about 20 acres of barren land and was still giving firefighters trouble Wednesday afternoon at Nine Mile River in Hants County.
