Parking Meters Debated In City Council Meeting

After much discussion a resolution was passed last night that the matter dealing with the purchase of 300 new parking meters be referred back to the police committee and the city recorder for further study. The motion was moved by Councillor Frank Zakem and seconded by Councillor Louis Johnston.

A heated debate arose when, at the conclusion of the town planning report Councillor Douglas MacDonald suggested that the City pay for these meters as a capital cost since they are being rented and will cost the City 80 per cent of their profits.

Councillor Louis Johnston stated that the matter pertaining to the purchase of the 300 meters should have been brought before the Council before they were ever purchased and "I am not in favour of the purchase of that amount of meters."

He went on to say that he was insinuating that Councillor John Morris, now or as a former member of the police committee, influenced them in regards to the purchase of the meters for the benefit of his friends.

Councillor Morris in reply to Councillor Johnston's insinuations stated that "I don't think you will find at any police committee meeting did I express the amount of meters desired."

He emphasized that the firm he had left will not receive rent for these meters for a period of 10 years and that they were not that enthusiastic about the deal.

"As far as I am concerned the purchase of the meters is outrageous. They will drive people who do business in the City right out of it," Councillor Johnston pointed out. He suggested that if the meters are to be purchased, the number should be decreased to possibly 60 instead of 300.

Mayor Walter Cox expressed the opinion that the criticism of the police committee was "very unfair, when the chairman of the police committee was not present last night to offer any defence."

Councillor Ivan Doherty emphatically stated that as a member of the committee Councillor Johnston was accusing him of being influenced and that this never occurred.

After other opinions were voiced, the motion was passed.

A resolution "that the City of Charlottetown strongly oppose the transfer of the Canadian National Railway's dispatcher's office and the staff to Moncton and that further consideration be given to this matter" was passed. The resolution was moved by Councillor John P. Nicholson and seconded by Councillor MacDonald.

Councillor Arthur Wright opposed the resolution since this was dealing with internal matters of the CNR and he felt not competent to vote on it.

A letter of guarantee is to be given to the Fathers of Confederation Building Trust in the amount of \$20,000 which would terminate when the grant is passed to the trust for the year 1966-67. This resolution was moved by Councillor Nicholson and seconded by Councillor Arthur Wright. A second resolution by the same two councillors "that

The truck which was purchased for \$750.00 from Crown Assets, will be used as a Hose Tender and will replace the old truck which will most likely be sold to the highest bidder.

Five tenders were received for a furnace to be installed in the Town Building, however, no decision was reached as to which tender would be accepted, due to the extreme difference in the amount of the tenders. It was decided to get clarification from the firms before making a decision.

Ed Downe who is still policeman for the town was present for the meeting and gave a brief outline on work that has been done on the streets in preparation for the winter. He also advised that sand boxes had been placed and that five cases had been before the court and that \$218.00 had been received in fines.

Councillor Hughes through the town clerk advised that taxes were being paid exceptionally fast and that the town now had a considerable surplus and no large outstanding bills had to be paid with the exception of the new fire engine which should arrive early in the new year and the annual grant to the new rink of \$1000.00.

At the conclusion of the meeting a discussion took place on the feasibility of a park area for trailers. The matter is to be taken up with the town planner.

The extension of the town in several areas is also to come under study and a decision will be made at a later meeting.

Pictou Man Assessed \$20

Vincent McAtuly of Pictou, N.S., was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days on a charge of loitering, when he appeared before Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, in city police court yesterday morning.

Lieutenant-Governor Will Be Veteran's Week Patron

His Honour Lieutenant-Governor W.S. MacDonald, has consented, to be Provincial Honorary Patron of Veteran's Week in 1967. Other plans are well underway in Prince Edward Island according to Vincent E. King, Chairman of the Provincial Planning Committee.

Meetings of all Veteran's Organizations have been held since Federal Cabinet approval and the announcement from Ottawa by Hon. Roger Tillet, Minister of Veterans Affairs, that the week of June 11th to 17th, 1967 would be designated "Veteran's Week in Centennial Year." While planning is not nearly completed the Chairman proposes that Sunday, June 11th will see Memorial Services held at various centres throughout the Province commemorating those Canadians — more than 112,000 of them — who have died in the wars in which Canada has been called upon to participate in since becoming a nation. Churches will be asked through the

Prince Edward Island Interfaith Conference of the Provincial Centennial Commission to plan special remembrance services on that day.

During the remainder of the week appropriate and colorful events will take place and these will include tributes to Canadian dead of all wars. It will provide Veterans with an opportunity to renew comradeships formed during service and the occasion will be used to inform the young people of the sacrifices and achievements of those who answered the call to arms when democracy was threatened.

Veterans in hospitals will be given special opportunity to participate in their own way.

The Royal Canadian Legion by its nature will take the initiative in organizing and carrying out the activities.
