RCMP Command Changes Hands

Command of 'L' Division RCMP here, officially changed hands yesterday when retiring Supt. A.S. McNeil signed the necessary forms turning command over to the newly-appointed commanding officer, Supt. R.P. Harrison. The official ceremony took place at the RCMP barracks on Malpeque Road.

Mr. McNeil's retirement brought to a close 35 years of service to his country.

Spanning a remarkable range of activities, his career took him over the ground of professional football fields and through the air in the Second World War as he served with the RCAF and retired from it with the rank of wing commander at the end of the war.

Born in Winnipeg on July 19, 1906, he received his early education at Brandon, Manitoba, and first joined the RCMP at Lethbridge in 1931. After training at Regina he served in various Manitoba and Saskatchewan detachments until transferred north to 'G' Division in 1934. He was with the aviation section of the RCMP until the war

started and was transferred to the RCAF in 1939, remaining there until 1945 when he returned to the RCMP as a corporal. The following year he was promoted to sergeant and in 1947 went to Police College at Rockcliffe, Ont., and in 1948 was promoted sergeant-major and posted to Edmonton.

Supt. McNeil received his commission as Inspector in November of 1951 and became adjutant at Depot Division, Regina, until 1953. During this time he commanded the RCMP Musical Ride in Canada and took it to the west coast of the United States. He then spent a year as training officer at Regina and in 1955 was posted as Canadian Representative to the U.S. Navy Task Force 62 Eastern Arctic Dew Line until the fall of that year.

He became officer commanding the Peace River Sub-Division in 1959 and was transferred to Charlottetown, where he has since served as commanding officer of 'L' Division. He was promoted to the rank of Superintendent in 1963.

Supt. McNeil is a member of

several clubs and organizations in this province, among them Rotary Club, Royal Canadian Legion, RCAF Association, Masonic Lodge, P.E.I. Cancer Society, P.E.I. Safety Committee, No. 60 Squadron RCAC, Committee of Stewards at Trinity United Church, P.E.I. Police Committee, Council member P.E.I.-Boy Scouts Association, and is a director of the P.E.I. Mental Health Association and the Atlantic Provinces Corrections Association.

He is married to the former Caroline Barbara Stauffer and they have two children, Campbell Sterling Laird who will graduate in engineering from Nova Scotia Tech this summer, and a daughter Barbara Caroline, a student at Mount Allison University, home economics, who is presently at the RCAF Station, Clinton, Ont.

Supt. McNeil plans some extensive travelling for his retirement with a leisurely European tour scheduled for this year.

Medical Missionary To Visit Province

An internationally known eye surgeon is making a brief visit to the province this week in the person of Dr. John Coapullai. Dr. Coapullai, a native of India, is a medical missionary specializing in Ophthalmic Surgery in a Baptist hospital in Sompetta. Dr. Coapullai was born into a Brahmin family, the son of highly educated parents. His mother's family was all of the priestly service and famous scholars of Sanscrit. On his father's side, the men had been working as high officials in the Government for generations.

The doctor's father was converted to Christianity many years ago and later led his son to accept the Christian faith.

Dr. Coapullai's basic medical education was in the American Presbyterian Medical College in Miraj and his post graduate training in Surgery and Ophthalmology were in Grant Medical College in Bombay.

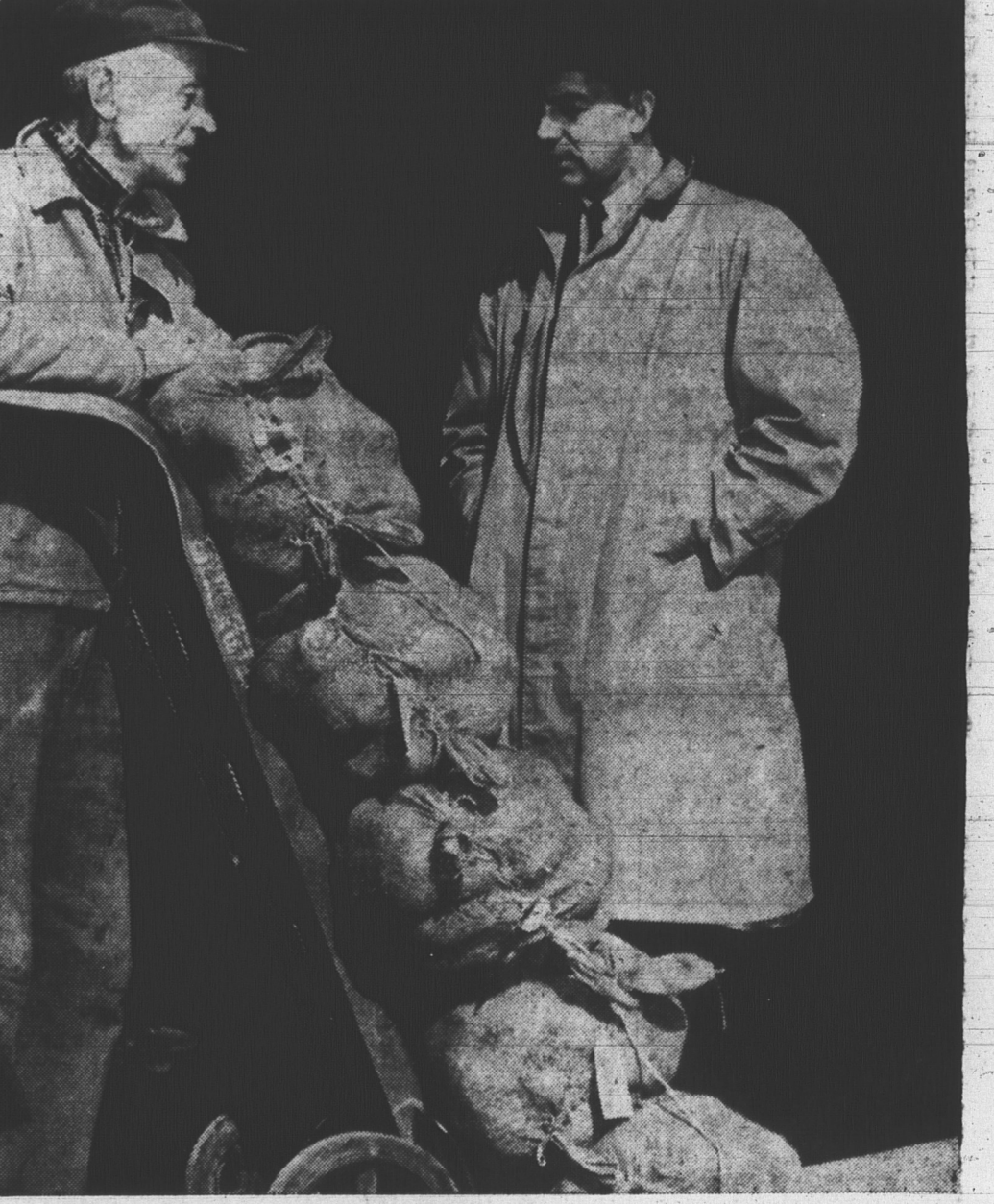
