November 11th Marks Our Day Of Memories

When the birches and maples are bare, and winds commence to blow chill on the fields, and frosts grip the morning's paths, we remember how in a burst of sunlight one November morning, and a lifting of the clouds that had shadowed the world for four years, at last peace had come. An Armistice was signed.

Would that serve to end forever all wars? Would it return the former peaceful living we Islanders had enjoyed: that charming era, when folks went to their customary rounds, when the word "war" was a strange one in our vocabulary, and to the children nothing more than a name read in school from a rather dusty history textbook? The years since with their subsequent, and it would seem more appalling wars, together with the cold war of distrust and suspicion which continues between people and nations, the skirmishes and unrest in far-away places, and the threat of such powers of destruction as those in the first Great War never dreamed of, have now disproved much we had relied on. It has given us the attitude not that "It can't happen again - not anywhere world-over" but rather an unqualified "Wait and see". So we wonder as the days come and go, will a small dark cloud here or there at a distance, develop into a menacing thunderhead to involve a number of nations? Will the peace councils which now keep, continue to find ways and means to solve the ever-increasing problems that come to them? No one, we think, can hazard a guess.

But now for November 11th, we rest our reflections for a time, and on the day set apart for it - Remembrance Day - honor the memories of those, the fallen ones of the war-times we have known. These are those who lie "row on row" in far cemeteries, or were lost in the deeps whose cenotaphs stand on city or town square, in country churchyards or by the school, they knew.

Reverent spots these are to come to. Lower your voice. Be silent. And remember. These gave up their all, home, kin, and friends. And life itself in a sacrifice that we might continue to enjoy our freedoms, among them that which gives us to walk those paths of life we most love.

What warriors they were! Even though the word was not theirs. Names and faces come back to us. We think of them - the lads we knew who, in many an instance only youngsters, marched away. Happy boys from farm and village from town and city, chuckling fellows, whose growing up had come too soon. The memory of those we would keep evergreen. Nor in our honoring would we for a moment forget the veterans laid aside in hospitals and rest-homes. Or it may be with their loved ones at home, as well as those who will parade solemnly in their service of remembrance, recalling so much, and lonely no doubt for those comrades they had known and respected, who had fought beside them gallantly and fell.

"But are they dead? Our hearts may ask. They lived, performed their glorious task. Spent, and were spent, and now they bask in Gloryland." Until Saturday --- Diary --- Good-night.

A report was given by Mrs. Leo Dolron on the regional conference held in Charlottetown recently, which was attended by nine members.

The spiritual director, Rev. Francis Corcoran, who had recently returned from his holidays, addressed the meeting. He spoke of visiting one of the young men of the parish who has joined the Greyfriars, in New York as a brother. Father Corcoran had said Mass there, and another native son of North Rustico, Ignatius Dolron served the Mass. There were also other island priests at the monastery which he described as beautiful, and in a beautiful setting.

Following Father Corcoran's address, the meeting adjourned, and a social hour and refreshments were enjoyed.

IDA BAILEY ALLEN Quick, So Easy, Sauces Of Canned Cream Soup

Several of the canned cream vegetable soups such as mushroom, celery, asparagus, spinach, and others provide a good basis for quick - do hot sauces. When combined with 1/4 to 2 c. diced cooked or canned meat or fish, or with sliced hard - cooked eggs, they extend the more costly ingredients and provide simple but hearty light entrees, that can be budgetwise. For instance:

Measurements level

Diced Cooked Lamb is delicious, heated in the contents of 1 (10 1/2 oz.) can cream of mixed vegetable soup combined with 1/4 soup-can hot water, served on toast and dusted with minced parsley. Serves 6.

Crab Flakes: Remove any fragments of shell from a (7 oz.) can crabmeat. Flake the crabmeat and stir into the heated contents of 1 (10 1/2 oz.) can cream of celery soup, combined with 1/4 soup - can hot green peas, and the contents 1 (2 1/2 oz.) can sliced mushrooms and liquid. Stir in 3 drops Tabasco and 1 tsp. lemon juice. Serve to 6 over flaky rice in bowls.

And here's a way to extend one sectioned oven-fried broiler to serve 8 persons:

CREAM OF CELERY SAUCE WITH SAUTEED CHICKEN LIVERS

1 (10 1/2 oz.) can cream of celery soup
1/4 can-measure water
1/4 tsp. pepper
3 drops Tabasco
1 tsp. mayonnaise
6 quartered washed chicken livers
1/4 tsp. flour
3 tsp. butter or margarine
2 tsp. dry sherry (optional)

1 (2 1/2 to 3 lb.) oven-fried sectioned broiler-fryer

Parsley for garnish

Combine soup, water, pepper, Tabasco and mayonnaise. Stir smooth and slow - heat. Meanwhile, dust quartered chicken livers with flour, and saute — 10

Semi-Annual Meeting Held Of ACW Diocesan Board

God's relationship to the world, God's relationship to us as persons and to the Church, were some of the topics discussed by delegates to the Dominion Annual meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of the Anglican Church held in Victoria, B. C., June 6th 1966, and reported by Mrs. H. S. MacPherson at the semi-annual meeting of the PEI Diocesan Board held in St. James Church, Port Hill.

The meeting opened with a service of Holy Communion with the rector, Rev. Delmont Yeo as celebrant. Following the service, and through the kindness of the rector, a buffet luncheon was served in the rectory. During this interval a display of Pakistani embroideries and WA Library books attracted great deal of interest.

The business session was convened at 1:30 p. m. with the president, Mrs. H. L. Palmer presiding. Rev. Mr. Yeo opened the meeting with gospel reading and prayers.

Following roll call and minutes of the last semi-annual, the members were privileged to hear a report of the 81st Dominion Annual meeting held in Victoria, B. C. presented by Mrs. H. S. MacPherson, acting as proxy for the president.

Mrs. MacPherson stated reports of Dominion Board officers are printed in the Living Message (She urged members to read these carefully)

Reporting for the department of family life (pre-school) Mrs. Crawford said "To assist in losing the pressures of society, which help to destroy the fabric of family life opportunity must be made available to visit Mothers and children at home, also for young mothers to meet together and try to provide happy experiences within the Church for families with pre-school age children." The educational chairman said an effort should be made to include women within the church, who are not WA members in this new program by holding study groups, conferences, etc.

The Dorcas secretary said as there is not as much clothing needed as formerly, projects within the diocese should be undertaken.

The editor of the Living Message said, she was quite disappointed in some dioceses, but PEI which is the smallest increased its subscriptions. Mrs. MacCallion hopes for a Living Message in every Anglican home.

The secretary for prayer partners reminded members never to neglect devotions at meetings because worship is the inspiration for all WA work.

The candidates chairman said

if some AWTC candidates should decide to return to their previous occupations or to marry and find full time careers as wives and mothers, they will be better equipped to serve God, whatever their vocation in life may be. In closing Mrs. MacPherson told of several conferences she attended when such topics as: Gods relationship to the world, to us as persons and to the Church were discussed. Mrs. Palmer extended a vote of thanks on behalf of all present to Mrs. MacPherson for her most interesting report.

Diocesan officers present presented short reports; Mrs. Cosh received \$76.00 for the Life membership Fund — The treasurers report showed a bank balance of \$1245.13. — Sale of Pakistani embroideries for the year amounted to \$200.00. — Successful J. A. and G. A. festival were reported by secretaries of this department.

Report of Dorcas work showed a total value of \$943.64 (school bale to La Tuzze, shipment to "Save the Children" and hospital bale to Pangiartung) a bulletin on the Canadian branch of Save the Children Fund contained a fine tribute to the work of Mrs. Lyman Davison and Mrs. James Harris.

For the educational department, Mrs. Shepherd said a collection of books has been produced for all ages, which shows the place of the Christian Church in the history of Canada — books recommended for adults are: "The Church Grows in Canada also "A New Look at World Missions". Reporting for the refugee project, Mrs. Hemming thanked all parishes, who have kept in touch with their adoptees during the summer - donations to the Cool Fund should be in no later than November 8th. Used stamps in good condition preferably with postmark included are urgent-ly needed.

The president urged branches to obtain copies of the constitution and by-laws and to write her giving their ideas on the new organization of "Anglican Church women" which she felt was flexible enough for branches to carry out projects of their choosing and it is up to the branches to decide the best way for their own groups to function.

Sharp Drop In Cigarette Use Reported

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A sharp decline in cigarette smoking by 1,500,000 men and women in an American Cancer Society study group was reported Wednesday to the American Public Health Association.

Dr. E. Cuyler Hammond of the American Cancer Society told the association that among the study group men smokers decreased more than 21 per cent from 1959 to 1965.

More than 12 per cent of the women in the group also quit smoking in the same period, Dr. Hammond said.

"Presumably, reports linking cigarette smoking to increased death rates from lung cancer, emphysema, heart disease, and certain other diseases had a major influence in this respect," Dr. Hammond said.
