IDA BAILEY ALLEN Sizzling Steak Success Made With Beef, Beef

IN MAINE, the game season is a high spot of the year. When the woods are filled with a variety of furred and feathered game is available, the G.O.U. members and members of the Maine Game and Fish Club get up at a taste - testing dinner. More than a dozen unusual dishes with traditional trimmings are available.

Measurements level; recipes for:

BEF STEAK AU POIVRE
2 1/2 lbs sirloin steak sliced 1/4" thick
1/4 tsp coarse - ground black pepper
1/4 tsp coarse salt
1/4 tsp olive oil

Rub steak on both sides with salt and pepper. In large skillet heat butter and oil together. When sizzling, add steak. Fast-sauté until seared and browned, turn with tongs 3 or 4 times on each side for rare; 5 to 6 min. for medium - rare.

Transfer to heated serving platter. Pour over pan juices. Garnish with spinach timbale, sautéed mushrooms, and Mexican and radish flowers.

Note from the Chef: To save time, use a 1 1/2 lb. round of beef, either beef or venison, add 1/4 c. beef bouillon, 1/4 c. fresh mushrooms, 1/2 c. butter to bubbling boil, 15 min. per lb. or until slightly thickened. Spoon over steak.

Get baby bear steaks on sale in specialty game stores. Broil, broiling, treat as directed yesterday in this column with meat tenderizer, following directions on the pkg.

TOMORROW'S DINNER
Yankee Bean Soup,
Chives Garnish
Broiler-Fryer Sections or French or French
Rabbit Sections Baked in Milk
Parried Whipped Potato, Sweet-Sour Beets
Frozen Rhubarb - Strawberry Pie
Coffee or Tea Milk

BROILER - FRYER SECTIONS BAKED IN MILK
2 sections (2 1/2-lb.) broiler-fryers
1 1/2 tsp seasoned salt
1/4 tsp. frozen dried shallots or 1/4 tsp. grated onion
1/4 tsp. oil - purpose flour or 1 tsp. instant flour
2 tsp. c. scalding hot milk (whole or skim)
1 c. hot chicken broth
1 c. water and 1 tsp. chicken bouillon powder
1/2 c. stringless crotons or canned French - fried onions

Dust chicken evenly all over with salt, shallots or onion and flour mixed. Arrange one layer in buttered low broiler - casserole that can go to - table. Pour over milk and chicken broth. Bake 35 min. in med. oven, 375 degrees F. Reduce heat to 325 degrees, 30 degrees. Uncover; continue to bake 25 min. more, or until fork - tender, and liquid is half reduced.

Strew over crotons, or heated French - fried onions. **RECIPE SECTIONS BAKED IN MILK:** In MILK: Use unpeeled, sectioned fresh rabbit or chicken; cook as described in the preceding recipe.
