Pensioner Is 'Overwhelmed' By Cent-A-Month Increase

SUMMERSIDE — A pensioner increase of one cent per month from the CNR has brought the income of a Kensington man, Lorne H. Weeks, who has been unable to decide how best to use the cheque for eight cents for the eight months retroactive pension increase that he has received.

The eight cent cheque issued over the signature of the CNR superintendent of pensions and welfare plan, was accompanied by a message telling Mr. Weeks that the pension had been adjusted from \$43.10 to \$43.18 monthly, on account of the back-logs made to him in the accordance with the 1961 general wage award.

The message from the CNR that accompanied the cheque was in the following terms: "The eight cent cheque retroactive pension due from the date of this month. Further cheques will be at the new rate."

Mr. Weeks, who was employed with the CNR over a period of 35 years, sustained an injury in a fall while working for the CNR in the island, he added.

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Crop Insurance Plan Is Termed Inadequate

The crop insurance proposal offered to P.E.I. potato growers could get a "cold shoulder" from the most adequate answer ever given to our potato producers' problems" by Leo P. McIsaac who spoke to a group of New Democratic supporters here last night.

Mr. McIsaac said the average cost of producing an acre of potatoes ranges from a minimum of \$190 to \$240 according to carefully kept records of several efficient island growers and "this compares favorably with cost records in Maine and N.B. Yet, he added the farmers here are offered a top coverage of 145 bushels per acre at a price of \$1.09 per bushel.

He charged that neither the provincial or federal minister of agriculture conferred with the island potato industry about details of the plan before it was offered Mr. McIsaac said that although he and his party were in full accord with the principle of crop insurance, he could not support, nor could he see any advantage to this proposal because of the inadequacy of both the coverage and the compensation.

Mr. McIsaac said that there were a large number of island growers who suffered severe losses during the past season because of blight disease. Many of those potatoes were seed and had to be sold for tablestock at substantial losses. He said that the department is going to have difficulty cleaning up this disease if some form of compensation is not forthcoming to the growers.

"No financial provision appears to have been made to encourage our growers to assist in this clean up," Mr. McIsaac said.

A study of crop insurance policies in the U.S. reveals that growers may insure their potato crop up to a value of \$250 per acre. This figure would be of some interest to island growers in going to pay an insurance premium for such inadequate

Blood giving is one of the finest ways by which we, as lay people, can help to save lives. It might be the life of a very dear friend or relative, or even our own.

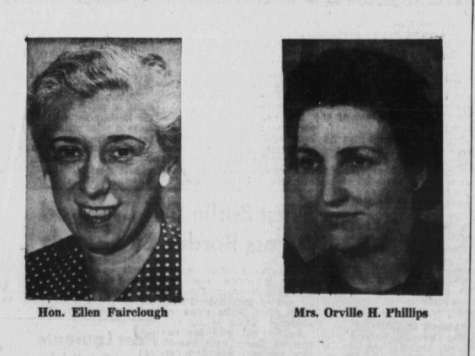
