PROFESSOR ROBERTSON AND THE WATCHMAN.

To the Editor of the Watchman: Sir,—What narrow escapes most of us have of being or becoming somewhat Chinese in spirit, if not in flesh.

I confess I was becoming a little proud, perhaps vain, and may be conceited, "just a kempt" man than was guide for me," over the all-too-generous appreciation which the people of Prince Edward Island have given to the work of the dairy service there. I was particularly pleased for the sake of those who are associated with me in this work, and who have given of themselves and of their home and family comforts more than the public know to advance the welfare of the Province. I am indebted to people all over Canada for royal hospitalities, and in none of these have I rejoiced more unreservedly than in the intellectual hospitalities of the newspapers and the men who are the power behind them. I have no hesitation in relying on the fairness of the Watchman to let me thank you through its columns for the part of the editorial about me, which was meant "to bring me to my senses."

I take the liking you intended for me on account of personal deficiencies, as being for my good, and I am too well nourished in spirit to let it create any Chinese resentment.

I admit that I am ambitious,—ambitions to render as large and lasting good service to my fellows as I can on my one journey through life. In so far as your editorial might prevent that, I desire to correct it. At no time and in no way have I ever cherished an unkindly feeling towards the Irish; and your remarks that I offered insults to them in public addresses or in private speech are wholly unwarranted and unjust. Those who were present at addresses I gave, when I jokingly referred to the diet of potatoes and buttermilk, know that neither in word, sentiment, nor intonation, was anything expressed but the most hearty liking and high regard for the admirable qualities which are everywhere known as being characteristic of Irishmen.

The best antidote I can offer to you and to the ill-effects of the otherwise heaped upon your references to the visit which I made to the Island at the time when Their Excellencies did the farmers of the Island the honor of attending the Agricultural Conference at Charlottetown, is to publish your letter to me after that occasion, and my answer to it. I had hoped that your better nature would have kept you from trying to give effect to the threat in its last sentence, and have threatened with fairness your words as a watchman,—or "messenger" to buffet me, lest I might be exalted above measure."

The following is a copy of the correspondence: Charlottetown, Aug. 13th, 1894. Prof. Robertson, Dominion Dairy Commr., Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Sir: I am with the other members of the Benevolent Irish Society feeling very indignant at being addressed by you from presiding at the Island to His Excellency at the Exhibition Building on Friday last. As President of the Society, I have been placed in a very false and ridiculous position, and as your objection to our address being read there, as manifested, was made to me by Mr. F. L. Hazard on the day before His Excellency arrived, I am forced to conclude that you and you only were the cause of our exclusion. I think that treatment, under the circumstances, simply contemptible, and I shall consider it my duty to resent it when and wherever I have an opportunity.

DEAR SIR: Your letter of 13th inst. was handed to me at Kensington this morning. It surprised me by its spirit and its language. Whatever disappointment you may feel at being, as you say, placed in a "false and ridiculous position" (of which I know nothing), cannot in any measure be laid at my door as blame. You know I did not have the pleasure of meeting you, knowing you, or hearing from you, until I met you at the door of the exhibition buildings. Our meeting then (so far as I know) was purely accidental.

You mentioned to me that you desired to present an address to His Excellency, that you had communicated with his secretary in reference thereto, and that he would let you know what time would be convenient. You very well know, or should know, that I had no right to interfere with the programme of the Agricultural Conference as published, and as accepted by the committee, Their Excellencies and the several speakers.

I told you that as a matter of courtesy to you and out of respect to the Benevolent Irish Society, which you represented, I would mention the matter to His Excellency as soon as he reached the building. This I did, and he said that he would appoint any time that would be convenient to yourself and his host on Friday evening or on Saturday.

I did not see you afterward; you did not call for me; the matter escaped my memory, as I did not think I was in any way to plan for you. I would have been glad to have helped you, if you had let me know; but after His Excellency mentioned that he thought the importance of an address from your Society merited a separate and special occasion, I am surprised to learn now that you took no steps to avail yourself of the privilege.

Until your letter came, had anyone mentioned the matter, I would have supposed that you had presented the address, and that given additional pleasure to their Excellencies.

Certainly His Excellency was not in any way to blame for your remissness; and if it affords you any benevolent satisfaction to transfer your disappointment with yourself to resentment towards me, I am sorry, and remain, Yours faithfully, Jas. W. Robertson.
