

All About Radio CIMN (Not CSUR)

Hard to believe, but there are still people in Charlottetown who don't know what the U.P.E.I. Student Radio Station is all about. So I'll try to present a few facts.

The station's call letters are CIMN, which stands for Campus, Information, music, and news. We were previously known as CSUR or Radio U.P.E.I. Our call letters officially became CIMN on October 30, 1974 when we were granted a broadcasting license from the Canadian Radio and Television Commission. Under the terms of the licence, we were not allowed to use CSUR and CIMN was the only station I.D. submitted that was approved by C.R.T.C. Now, this licence is the same type of licence granted to any other radio station in Canada. The difference is that we can only broadcast under a power output of 20 watts. This gives the station only enough power to cover the entire University area. We accept advertising from Charlottetown firms, produce our own commercials in most cases, and do the same things that the largest stations in Canada do; only we do them on a smaller scale. Perhaps, in a few years, we will apply to the CRTC for a permit to boost our power output enough to cover all of the Charlottetown area.

There is also a possibility of the radio station getting a channel on the T.V. cable when it is installed in Charlottetown, but these events are in the future.

Before the year is over, Radio CIMN will have installed a complete new studio. So instead of single studio we now have, we will have a Master Control room and a production room. This should increase the broadcasting quality immensely.

Just recently, Radio CIMN received a Xaviera Hollander tape from U.N.B. This tape was recorded live at a talk show with Ms. Hollander at U.N.B. and was made available to CIMN through the A.A.U.B. tape exchange program.

A.A.U.B. stands for Atlantic Association of University Broadcasters and consists of 9 Maritime University radio stations. Every two weeks CIMN will receive a tape of some event from one of the other Universities. CIMN will also be producing tapes and sending them to other Universities.

For the last six weeks, D.J.'s from CIMN have been playing disco music at the Tradewind lounge. This is a joint venture between Radio CIMN and the Tradewind owners and is working out very well.

The University has been so gracious as to build the station two new offices at no charge to the Student Union. These offices are for the Station Manager and the Music Director and were sorely needed. The existing office will be used as the record library.

CIMN also presents an open line talk show every Wednesday noon hosted by Maurice Rogerson. All students are welcome to call in and voice their opinions.
