A Short Crop.—It is stated that the Nova Scotia cranberry crop will be short owing to the early frost. The total yield is estimated at 3000 barrels in the two counties where this berry is principally grown. It should have been 5000.

Ethel Tucker Company.—At the Opera House this afternoon the Ethel Tucker Company are playing "Fanny's Choice," the smallest they have yet had. This evening they play a farewell performance, the famous English melodrama, "The Fugitive."

From Montreal.—The steamer Coban arrived from Montreal yesterday afternoon about four o'clock, and left again at six this morning. Her outward cargo included 18 head cattle, 75 sheep, and one horse, besides a large quantity of produce, etc. Mr. Minto and Mr. Deek were the only passengers, the former going to St. John's and the latter to Sydney.

Tricycle Record Broken.—John S. Johnson broke the world's record for two miles, paced, flying start, at New Garden Park track, Chicago, on Thursday afternoon. He made the mile in 2.32 1/2, breaking the record previously held by Berlo of 3.43 1/2, made at Louisville, Nov. 18th, 1895. The first mile was made in 1.41 2/3 and the second in 1.51 1/3.

Graduated With Honors.—Mr. Louis M. LeLacour, of Murray Harbor South, son of Mr. B. LeLacour of that place, has been awarded a diploma for a complete business course at the P. E. 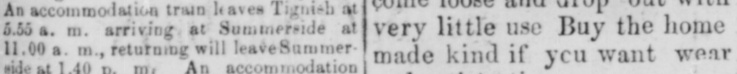
