CLEARING THE DECK.

MIDNIGHT RAID BY PIRATES ON A P. E. ISLAND VESSEL.—MATE WILLIAMS' BRAVE DEFENCE.—FOUR PIRATES CAPTURED.—ONE DROWNED.

The schooner *Victor*, which cleared from New York on the 14th instant, lay in Flushing Bay on the 17th, when she was entered by river pirates. The New York *Herald* gives the following account of the matter:—

At three o'clock, something aroused the mate. He sat up and listened, but for a time only heard the swash of the water against the vessel's timbers. He was composing himself again when a sound on the deck above him caught his ear and brought him to his feet in a twinkling. It was the scuffling of stealthy footsteps, and presently he heard the clank of metal as the fastenings of the hatch were stirred. Without dreaming of what was afoot, the mate hurried to the foot of the companion-way. It was already open, and the entrance was blocked by two men who already began descending.

"Hallo" called out the mate, "what do you want?"

The dim swinging cabin light by this time fell on the face of the first comer—a rough one, utterly strange to him, the mate saw—and as he uttered his challenge he saw the intruder's hand slipping into his pistol pocket, and with the quick instinct that danger was impending, he swung about into his sleeping place and caught up a pair of pistols. He was back at the companion-way before the others were down, and, without singling out the dark figures above him, he turned up the muzzle of his revolver and pulled the trigger twice. As the shots rang out there was a hurried noise in the companion-way, a scuffling of feet on deck and, as Williams peeped out through the powder smoke, he saw the stars shining through the open hatch, without any obstacle between him and them. He dashed up the steps, a weapon in each hand, and came out upon the deck. All was still there as when he left it, but off forward he saw a cluster of dark forms, and the figures of the two intruders rearing before him. There were five men in all on deck, and, as the mate came out, they made a movement as though to sweep down upon him. Raising his revolver at this, he sent a bullet over their heads, but in a trice he was answered, and three pistol flashes, seemingly from the men who had entered the cabin, were followed by a whistling of bullets uncomfortably close to the mate's ears. He pulled trigger again at this, and sent shot after shot forward, and, advancing as he fired, he shouted aloud, "I'll riddle you, if you don't clear out of this!"

A PRECIPITATE RETREAT.

There was a movement in the dark knot on board, and the mate, thinking they were about to throw themselves upon him, lifted his weapon again; but at this moment a chattering of voices was heard on the fore-castle, the crew came tumbling up, and the strangers, seeing all was up for them, made a dash for the side and flung themselves over it. Their haste was suicidal. For one it was a dash to death; for the others to duress, because as the avalanche of frightened men came down upon the yawl she turned over and sent the whole party into the water. As the *Victor's* men came to the side, their hostility gave place to a feeling of pity. Under their eyes there was great splashing and spluttering in the gloom. Struggling forms were moving about; and a little off, going further in the waves, was the upturned boat, with two dark figures bobbing up and down at its stern. Williams, who had cleared the deck, was not behind hand, now that a deed of mercy was to be done. "Lower away the boat, he called, and as a set of men dropped into the schooner's boat he jumped after them and headed for the schooner's bow toward which the men in the water had been drifting. A voice heard before in the darkness, crying "Help me, I'm drowning!" reached the ears of the crew again, and quickened their speed, and as the boat shot out of the vessel's shadow they saw they were in time. Clinging to the anchor chain, to which they had been washed, and struggling to sustain themselves by a rope at the bow, were three men who turned supplicating faces to the men they had come to plunder. The boarders of ten minutes before were thoroughly cowed now, and gratefully submitted to being hauled aboard and taken back to the vessel as prisoners. Williams was the first on deck, and as man after man was lifted on deck he had him securely fettered and taken below. The boat was then shoved off again and rowed in the direction of the overturned yawl. It had been washed out of sight now, and although the *Victor's* men pulled about in the darkness with a will and shouted till they were hoarse, they saw no trace of the missing boat, nor heard any answering cry. Satisfied that the yawl and the hapless pair clinging to it, had gone down, they rowed back to the vessel and then mounted guard till day-break over the prisoners. One of the men

was picked off the yawl by the captain of the schooner which lay about a half mile from the *Victor*. The other was drowned.

At day break the tug *General Mead* passed, and was signaled. She came alongside and the prisoners were taken to the Central Office, New York, and there taken in charge by Captain Cluehey. They gave their names as James Morgan, Thomas J. Reilly, Joseph Lynch and James McMahon. It was Morgan who was picked off the yawl. He said the man who was washed away with him on the yawl was John O'Rourke. He had received one of the mate's bullets as he tumbled over the side, and as he floated beside him in the water, with his hand on the sinking boat, he muttered "I'm shot," and soon sank out of sight. They were all committed for examination by Judge Morgan.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

WASHINGTON, May 20.

The race between Hanlan and Riley will be for \$2,000 over the same course rowed yesterday.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 19.

Senator John B. Gordon has sent in his resignation to the United States Senate, to take effect immediately. The Governor has accepted the resignation, and will appoint his successor to-morrow.

ST. PAUL, May 19.

The Minnesota Republicans in Convention instructed its delegates to the Chicago National Convention to present the name of Senator Windom for President.

TORONTO, May 20.

The *Globe* this morning contains the following special cablegram, dated London, May 19th: I am authorized to inform Hanlan through the columns of the *Globe* that Trickett challenges him to row on the Thames, in the middle of November, for the championship of England and £200 a side. He has posted the money to-day to the editor of the *Sportsman*. The Trickett party desire an immediate cable reply from Hanlan addressed to the editor of the *Sportsman*, London, who will refund Hanlan expenses incurred in cabling. There is plenty of money behind Trickett and bets to any amount are forthcoming.

PLYMOUTH, Mass., May 20.

The case of Henry Gunn, on trial for the murder of his father in September last, was given to the jury at 7.30 to night, who, after four hours deliberation, returned a verdict of murder in the second degree. The judge immediately pronounced sentence of imprisonment in the States prison during the term of his natural life.

LONDON, May 20.

The *Daily News* understands that Charles Bradlaugh will go to the Commons and take the oath. It is believed his competence to do so will be controverted.

The meeting last night of the constituents of Mr. Plimsoll was very enthusiastic. After a statement by Mr. Plimsoll, giving as a reason for vacating his seat that Sir Wm. Harcourt would further his shipping reforms, a resolution was passed unanimously, but reluctantly, inviting Sir Wm. Harcourt to become their candidate.

The British Commissioner has written to the Burmese ambassadors that it is necessary to postpone business for the present and the embassy is requested to return. Lord Lytton wishes to leave his successor free to take up treaty negotiations or not.

CABUL, May 20.

Abdul Rahman Khan has dismissed his army, saying he does not need it as he has no present hostile intention toward England.

BERLIN, May 20.

News from St. Petersburg is that the confirmation of the report of the sentence of Chung How has decided Russia to recall her *charge d'affaires* from Peking and place her subjects in China under the protection of the United States.

Germany intends to increase her naval force on the eastern Asiatic station as soon as relations between Russia and China assume a more grave aspect.

Lord Archibald Campbell, now on a visit to his brother the Governor General, has odd ideas of the secrecy of the ballot, if the following can be relied on:—

"It seems," says the *Glasgow News*, that Lord Archibald Campbell, voting for his brother, was furnished with a paper and voted. He afterwards raised a question that his vote had been recorded in a manner that would render it void. The precise cause of the alleged invalidity of the vote is unknown, but it is not material to the point raised, which is contained in what followed. Feeling anxious about the vote, Lord Archibald ordered and induced the Sheriff to break the seal of the ballot-box, to rummage among the papers to find Lord Archibald's to abstract it from the box, to destroy it and give him another paper, with which he voted. That the voter who incited the Sheriff to act was the son of the laird and the brother of the candidate rather aggravated the impropriety of the proceeding; and certainly if the seal of the ballot-box is to be broken at the bidding of any elector who has made a mistake or permitted himself to act on the mistake of another, the secrecy of the ballot is a farce."
