

Viceroy and Ameer.

MEETING OF THE EARL OF DUFFERIN AND AMEER ABDURRAHMAN AT RAWALPINDI.

[By Cable to the New York Herald.]

RAWALPINDI, March 27.—The Earl of Dufferin, Viceroy of India, has arrived here. He was accorded a most imposing reception by Abdurrahman, the Ameer of Afghanistan. The Ameer, in his address of welcome, said he hoped that the councils which the Earl of Dufferin had come so far to attend would be so guided as to ensure an honorable and lasting peace.

In reply, Lord Dufferin said he was glad that his first public act as Viceroy of India was to cultivate friendly relations with the sovereigns of the States contiguous with the frontiers of India.

"I trust," continued Lord Dufferin, "that the friendly reception which is about to be accorded to me as Her Majesty's representative by the Ameer will prove to all our neighbors our firm intention and our anxious desire to respect their rights."

At the railway depot at Rawalpindi there were assembled, when the train carrying Lord Dufferin arrived, the Punjab chiefs and Gen. Stewart, Gen. Roberts, Gen. Hardinge and a number of other high officials. After an interchange of official and personal greetings, Lord Dufferin proceeded to the camp. The route was lined with troops, and the military display made was very effective. The soldiers greeted the Viceroy with great enthusiasm.

The authorities of Rawalpindi later in the day presented Lord Dufferin with an address, declaring their loyalty to Her British Majesty the Empress of India, and expressing appreciation of honor done Rawalpindi in selecting it as the meeting place of the council.

The address of the Rawalpindi authorities concluded with the following statement:—"This recognition of our dignity will confirm that confidence in us which is daily receiving expression from all the rulers of India."

The Earl of Dufferin responded to the Rawalpindi address very happily, and ended by saying:—"The offers of loyalty and service made upon this occasion are that the most eloquent proofs of England's steadfast good faith and of the noble confidence of our friends."

The Prospects of Wheat.

In certain parts of the Western States it is reported that the winter wheat has been killed by the cold weather, and while it is not possible to determine what extent of the wheat area has thus been affected, enough is known to warrant the belief that the deficiency in produce in the new crop, as compared with last year's crop will be large. This may lead to important results, for it is only one of the causes, and not one of the most active, that are tending to a "short" wheat crop this year. The great fall in the price of wheat cannot but be a factor in the situation, for it will discourage the breaking in of new wheat lands, and will also lead to the devoting of area hitherto under wheat to other crops. The season is not sufficiently far advanced to determine to how great an extent this movement has occurred. It is reasonably safe to say that its results will be very marked, world is always within one year of starvation, each year's produce being only a little more than is necessary to support the population.

A Woman Did It.

Bernard Haller, a helper in the kitchen of a restaurant in Williamsburg, N. Y., tried to kill himself on the 26th ult., by cutting the arteries in his wrist. He was found lying on a cot, and nearly all the blood in his body was in a pool on the floor. The prompt arrival of the ambulance surgeon who stanching the flow of blood, saved the man's life. When questioned at the hospital as to why he tried to take his life, Haller said:—"I am in trouble about a woman and this morning I tossed up a penny to see whether I would kill myself or not. If the penny turned up 'head' I would not cut myself. I lost—it turned up 'tail' and I had to do it."

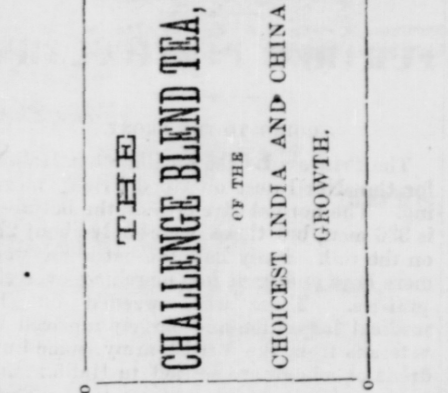

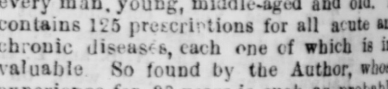
