AT THE RINK.

Interesting Hockey Match—Exhibition of Fancy Skating.

The star of the second Victorias is still in the ascendant. Last night they played their second match for the intermediate trophy going up against the St. Dunstan's team, and won by a score of 5 to 3. The game was played in Hillsborough rink, and was witnessed by one of the largest audiences of the season.

The game was fast and furious while the puck was in play, and there was no combination work worth speaking about. Hockey sticks were broken and players were thrown about the ice describing all kinds of attitudes. But little things like that did not seem to spoil the temper of the players, and there was no hard feeling visible.

In the first half, after the rubber had been kept whizzing about twenty minutes, McPherson scored for the Saints, and about five minutes later Weeks evaded the score by shooting for the Vics.

Within ten minutes after the face-off in the second half the Vics had added three goals to their score, and before the close of the game they shot another. The Saints also added two goals to their string, making them 3 to their opponents 5.

The Summerside Stars will play the return hockey match with the Abegweits on Tuesday next the 23rd inst. The teams will be the same as played in Summerside, and the game will be well worth witnessing.

The hockey match was preceded by an exhibition of fancy skating given by Miss Fannie Davidson and her brother Mr. John Davidson. It was expected that this feature of the entertainment would begin at 8 o'clock, but it was not until 8.25 that the skaters appeared on the ice, and the wait had a depressing effect upon the spectators. The costumes worn by the skaters were neat and appropriate. Both appeared on the ice in an outside roll movement. Then Miss Davidson alone performed the outside roll, inside roll, grape vine, outside roll backwards, grape vine with variations, figure three, Philadelphia twist, outside edge roll with steps on tip toe, which had a pleasing effect, winding up her performance with certain combinations with an outside roll. Her movements were regular and graceful, skillfully executed and her figures and curves were well defined. Mr. Davidson then appeared, executing outside edge combinations, inside edge with pirouettes, very neatly done. He spins on one foot and on both feet gained for him well merited applause; his movements were rapid, difficult and very cleverly performed, showing great agility. He wound up with the "wheel barrow" and "spread eagle" acts. Then both skaters appeared with hand joined and after going through Dutch roll backwards and forwards, grape vine, a combination movement, figure eight with variations, a gliding waltz and a waltz on tip toe, the performance ended, having lasted some twenty minutes. No fault could be found with the quality of the entertainment; but the quantity seemed a little meagre, and there was a good deal of disappointment over their failure to appear during the rest in the hockey match. However the exhibition was well worth seeing, and on Wednesday evening, when they give another performance, there will probably be a large attendance.
