MONTREAL (CP) — The U.S. dollar Monday closed at a discount of 3-8 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, down 1-16. Pound sterling \$2.69, up 1/8.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) — Amid the lightest trading in three years, the stock market Monday drifted gently lower.
Base metals were one-half point easier while golds managed a small gain.
Brunswick, Quebec Lithium, Can-Met, Glacier, Advocate, Opeka and Northspan were among the heavier losers in the mining list. McIntyre lost three points at 80 in senior golds. Uraniums and senior base metals eased.
Senior western oils lost fractional ground. Lower-priced stock moved down in a 20-cent range.
Central Explorers bucked the trend with a 32-cent gain at \$2.87.
Index changes: Industrials off 1.17 to 424.06; golds up .06 to 78.38; base metals off .48 to 167.36; western oils off 1.66 to 154.13.

MONTREAL

MONTREAL (CP) — The Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges ended a quiet day of business Monday with about two minus signs for every plus.
McCull Oil fell 2 1/2 to a new low of 58. Pacific Petroleum dropped 1 1/2 to 23 1/2 and B.A. Oil 1/2 to 40 1/2. But Imperial Oil gained 1/2 at 43 1/2. Trans-Mountain Pipe Line lost 2 points at 76.
B.C. Power fell a point to 26. Other utility stocks were mixed fractionally. Miscellaneous issues were mixed in a low fractions.
A.V. Rose lost 1/2 at 13 1/2.
In beverages, Walker at 60 1/2 gained 1/2. Other movements were fractional losses. Base metals were mixed fractionally. International Nickel lost 1/2 at 75 1/2.
Consolidated Paper marked the greatest movement in newspaper stocks, falling 1/2 to 29 1/2. Others were mixed.
Canadian Bank of Commerce fell 1/2 to 41 1/2 and Bank of Nova Scotia dropped a point at 52 while Toronto Dominion Bank gained 1/2 at 39 1/2.
Steels were mixed. Steel of Canada, the most active in its group, dropped a point at 54 1/2. Dosco gave away 1/2 at 32 1/2.
The exchange's closing average show banks off 37 at 46.77, utilities off 3 at 132.8, industrials off 2.3 at 47.2, combined off 1.8 at 309.1, papers off 0.68 at 1081.92 and golds off .51 at 71.33.

NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market slid off lazily Monday making its record of "blue Monday" 11 straight. But the decline was so moderate and unemphatic it gave Wall Street no special cause for grief.
Key issues were down from fractions to a point or more and there was an assortment of gainers among pivotal stocks running about the same range.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks made a slight dip of 30 cents to \$165.20, with the industrials down 50 cents, the rails down 10 cents and the utilities unchanged.
Standard Oil (New Jersey) was the most active stock, unchanged at 56 1/2 on 36,300 shares. Second was Allegheny Corp., off 1/2 at 6 1/2 on 32,400 shares. Third was General Motors, off 1/2 at 40 1/2 on 23,700 shares.
Canadian issues on the New York exchange closed mostly lower but Walker - Gooderham was up 1/2. Losers included McIntyre Porcupine, off 1/2; Granby Mining, 1/2; Distillers-Seagrams, 1/2; Dome Mines, 1/2 and International Nickel, 1/2.
