Break 45 Miles From Winnipeg Flood Punches Big Hole In Dike

WINNIPEG (CP)—A new crest on the flooded Assiniboine river Friday punched a 150-foot hole in a dike, 45 miles west of here, sending a one-foot wall of water surging over rich farm land on its north bank only one mile from the main east-west highway.

Someone had dynamited the dike during the night and asked RCMP to investigate. One farmer said he heard an explosion during the night but army engineers directing the battle against the flood said they had done so blasting.

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Dr. MacKinnon stressed the need for public relations in both public health and in education. Shield Eskimos From Yanks

OTTAWA (CP)—The Eskimo way of life in Canada's far north is to be shielded against the inroads of United States construction crews moving in to build the DEW (distant early warning) radar line.

Detailed arrangements designed to avoid contact between them are set out in a Canada-U.S. agreement providing for American construction of the DEW line. The agreement was tabled Friday in the Commons by External Affairs Minister Pearson.

Cover Many Conditions

These conditions cover such things as manufacture of electronic equipment, as far as practicable, in Canada; equal consideration for Canadian and U.S. contractors in awarding contracts; preference to Canadian labor; application of Canadian law; and the protection of the Eskimo population.

The DEW line is being built along the northern mainland coast. The eastern end will be on Baffin Island. Generally, it will lie along the 70th parallel. Canada is now building and paying for, the mid-Canada radar line along the 55th parallel. Its estimated cost is \$200,000,000.
