Scramble For Final Say On Radio, TV Continues

Progressive Conservatives may have the last laugh after all in the fight to acquire the final slot of time on television in the current election campaign, which must cease on TV and radio midnight, tonight.

After a Thursday report that Tom Dunphy, NDP organizer had scored a host by planning three months ago to acquire the final half hour on television, the Progressive Conservatives quickly announced that Prime Minister Diefenbaker instead, will have the last say in the final television campaign.

Pointing out that Prime Edward's official time as Atlantic Standard and not Daylight Saving, and that it will not officially be 12 midnight on P.E.I. until 1 a.m. Saturday morning, the PC campaigners have hired a 12:15 to 12:30 time slot on CPKY-TV.

They intend to show a 15-minute film strip of Mr. Diefenbaker, in which the Prime Minister is expected to make several last-minute announcements.

However, there is time yet for the other parties to have the last say, with the final half hour still open.

Training Session Conducted For Augustine Cove Leaders

A local committee including Mrs. Raymond Wood, Rev. L. R. Graves, and Lester MacFarlane arranged for the billeting of those in attendance at the training session. The hospitality of the people of Tryon contributed much to the success of this new venture.

A host of interested and dedicated people have been planning and working on committees to assure those boys a 12 girls who take advantage of the church camp program at Augustine Cove, that everything possible will be done to make them happy and comfortable.

At a recent camp management committee, chaired by David Murphy, plans were made to install electric lights and a pump at the camp site, and to procure a propane stove if possible.

The committee gratefully accepted the proposal of the Summerside United Church Men's Association to build and furnish a new cabin. Several other associations have pledged substantial amounts of financial aid.

Mr. Murphy also announced that additional camp application forms may be obtained from him at 29 Palmer's Lane, Parkdale.

MacLean Says Causeway Out If Liberals Elected

Hon. J. Angus MacLean, speaking in an overflow-hall in York last night, charged that if the Liberals were elected the Causeway would never be built.

In expanding this statement, the minister quoted a Liberal candidate in Ontario who, in speaking on behalf of the Poirer team, said that taxes would remain the same "if Atlantic Causeway's are eliminated and we'll eliminate them, that's a promise."

"Nevertheless," said Mr. MacLean, "this is the very same party that declares locally it will build the causeway. It would seem," the minister declared, "they contradict themselves in their own words, nevertheless, these same Liberals expect the people of this country to overlook such political duplicity, and vote them into power on Monday next."

Another issue raised by the federal fisheries minister was "the constant harping by the opposition about government deficits. They did not say a word," the minister continued, "when the deficits were piling up here in P.E.I. Apparently, he observed, Liberalism believes in financial starvation for the little provinces, to produce a surplus in Ottawa."

NEW ARMOURIES
Pointed to with pride by the Conservative candidate were the special grants which Prime Minister Diefenbaker has indicated immediately on taking office, as well as work-making projects such as naval barracks, Charlottetown runway, Hillsboro bridge and causeway, department of transport wharf, heavy financial assistance to the hospitals, and a new armoured car, Charlottetown, "which is now in the planning stage," he said.

Another point which received emphasis from Mr. MacLean was the fact that over a period of the past five years, farm income was up considerably, whereas, in the five years preceding that, under Liberal rule, farm income had dropped.

The fisheries minister stated that a survey by a team of experts is now being carried out in this province with a view to locating such a plant on P.E.I. "Think what this would mean to island agriculture," the minister stated, adding that he was extremely optimistic in this regard.

The Conservative candidate in Queen's concluded his speech by stating that he had, in the course of the campaign, visited the four Atlantic provinces and observed that, in his opinion, "the Maritime Provinces are staying with the Conservatives because they know a good thing when they see it, and when the votes are counted on June 18, those provinces by the sea will once more lead the country."

Hospitals And Unions To Negotiate

The boards of the Charlottetown Hospital and the Prince Edward Island Hospital have been requested to resume negotiations with locals 808 and 826, respectively, of the National Union of Public Employees, for 1962 contract agreements.

Labour and Welfare Minister Henry Wedge said yesterday that he has been advised by union representative, John P. MacMillan, Saint John, N. B., that the union received Mr.

Wedge's directive to resume negotiations.

The union was said to be asking wage increases of 30 per cent for non-professional employees of the hospitals. Hospital boards felt that they may not be able to honor a contract that provides for wage increases as the provincial hospital services commission sets hospital budgets.

Mr. Wedge directed that the union and hospital boards resume negotiations. If the matter cannot be resolved it will go to conciliation.
