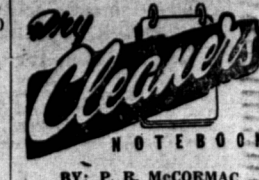

Local Couple Leaves On Trip To Europe; Away 7 Weeks

Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Jenkins left here today on a trip that will take them through at least seven countries of Europe in as many weeks. Mr. Jenkins is going to Germany as the guest of Volkswagen of Canada, along with some forty other distributors across the country. Mrs. Jenkins is going with him and her expenses are also being paid, except for the actual transportation. The trip through Germany is elaborate and takes the visitors to practically every interesting part of the country. They leave Montreal on Wednesday morning and fly direct to Hannover where they are scheduled to arrive early Thursday morning. After a full day there they go to Wolfsburg by bus. Then they go by train (sleeper) to Wuerzburg, then by bus to Munich, including along the way such interesting spots as Rottenturm-Tauber, and Augsburg. They put up in the Munich hotel overnight. At most of the stops they are visiting Volkswagen factories and plants. On Sunday, September 15th they visit, among other things,

a famous old castle, an old baroque church and get a panoramic view of the Alps. Monday at noon they depart by bus on the famous Autobahn (superhighway) and go to Baden-Baden via Stuttgart and put up overnight at Baden Baden. On Tuesday they visit the Black Forest that was prominent in the news during the war. Then they go by bus to Heidelberg where they spend the night. On Thursday they go to Frankfurt on Main and on Friday leave by bus for Ruedesheim via Wiesbaden and will embark on a steamer for a 7-hour trip on the Rhine to Cologne. They will have luncheon on board and spend the night at a hotel in Cologne. That evening there will be a big farewell dinner in Cologne and the following day the tour ends with breakfast in the City. Following this official conducted tour through Germany Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins plan on visiting Switzerland, France, Italy, Holland, England and Scotland. They expect to be away six or seven weeks in all.

Dundas Preparing For Big Plowing Match Next Week

The people in Dundas and vicinity are working strenuously at the present time on the final preparations for the Provincial Plowing Match and Agricultural Show which will be held at Dundas next Wednesday and Thursday. It started as a plowing match back in the early 1940's and it still is referred to in general as "The Provincial Plowing Match" but in recent years it has taken on all of the additions which make it a complete agricultural fair. For example classes are now provided for all four dairy breeds of cattle and also for the Herefords and Shorthorns, the two older beef breeds here. In addition there are the many exhibits shown in the main building. These include vegetable and root crops as well as field crops of various kinds. Included also is just about every type of women's work from skillfully sewn, crocheted and knitted goods to the latest fashions in the various pleasurable ladies of this province have learned to produce through the years. There is also fun for the young men and for the children. One day is devoted to athletic sports for the mature athletes. The other is given over to a sports program for the younger athletes, the ones who will be the senior athletic greats of the future years. But when one thinks of Dundas he almost naturally thinks of plowing and that is what created the annual meet which attracts each year the largest crowd that attends any purely agricultural fair in the entire province. President Leslie Hunter of Bridgetown and Secretary Albert Acorn of Cardigan have been working with their directors to line up the various plowing matches and competitions which will be climaxed as usual by the big Esso Special championship class the last thing on Thursday afternoon. This extra special match is a battle of champions. In it, for example, will be Carl Willis, the County champion this year. He will be competing against senior class winners at Dundas this year. Eligible also to compete will be a number of other plowmen including some of the champions and class winners of other years.

Enrollment At Prince Of Wales

A total of 527 students have enrolled to date in Prince of Wales College, the Guardian learned last night from Mr. Gordon Bennett, registrar. Included among them are two Hungarian girls who are taking senior matriculation (third year). They are Ester Varga and Ilona Huszin who arrived in the Province last week. There are seventy-one students attending third year, which is first year university, and twenty students attending fourth year which is actually sophomore year at university. First year students number 218. There are 120 students in second year taking the academic course, fifty-five taking the commerce course and forty-three taking normal training.

Impose \$65 Fine On Driver

A fine of \$65 and costs or 30 days was levied by County Magistrate Gilbert A. Gudet yesterday on a man for having care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol. Another man was fined fifty dollars and costs or 30 days for driving a motor vehicle while his license was cancelled. Another fine of \$30 was levied on a man for having liquor in his possession at a place other than his residence. This was under the Temperance Act and the alternative to the fine was a thirty-day sentence. Three were fined ten dollars and costs or then days in jail for speeding on the highway. One man was fined five dollars or five days for driving without a license and the same penalty was imposed on another for driving with defective equipment. A case of assault causing bodily harm, was adjourned to September 20th by consent after considerable evidence had been heard. This decision is equalled only by my conviction that it is the right one and that any other would not be fair to the party through which I have had the honor—and which I have no greater—to serve my country for so many years.

Veteran Leaves For London On I.O.D.E. Scholarship

D. F. Sigsworth leaves Sept. 6 for Halifax from where he sails on the fourteenth of September, for England. In England he will begin studies in the London School of Economics and Political Science at the University of London. He goes abroad as the winner of the I.O.D.E. War Memorial Post-Graduate Scholarship which entitles him to study at any university in The Commonwealth of Nations. Born in Charlottetown, Mr. Sigsworth is a graduate of Queen Square School, Prince of Wales College, St. Dunstan's University and the University of Montreal. While studying at the University of Montreal he was a member of the faculty of Loyola College where he taught Mathematics and Physics. Following a three year tour of duty with the Canadian Army he accepted his release with the rank of Captain in October, 1954, last year, and entered the Law School of Dalhousie University. While a student there he was also a member of the faculty of St. Mary's University where he was lecturer in English Literature. He was also on the staff of the Bureau of Current Affairs of the Department of National Defence, and during the year he lectured world politics to the officers and men of the Halifax Garrison of the Canadian Army. In England, Mr. Sigsworth's academic work will be concerned with legal studies related to politics and international affairs. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Sigsworth of Charlottetown.

Shark Started (Continued from page 1) the boat. It was not until Captain Griffin and his crew came upon them that they had any glimmer of hope for a rescue. In Captain Griffin's crew were his grandfather, Ernest Griffin, and Archie White. On land, two search parties worked right through the night, and through the day until the word of a rescue at sea reached them. One party searched east from Clearsprings as far as Priest Pond. The other searched the shoreline westward from Clearsprings as far as Naurage Harbor. The search parties were organized by Cpl. Sandford, R.C.M.P. Sours. After coming ashore Mrs. Johnston, speaking for her husband and Mr. Hennessey, expressed grateful thanks to Captain Griffin and his crew for persistence in the search and rescuing them. The Johnstons live at the Norwood Apartments, North River Road. Mr. Johnston is the engineer at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, Mrs. Johnston is a nurses-side at the Sanatorium.
