He is now doing as well as can possibly be expected.—Stonewall News, Man. THE young man above referred to is an Islander, and son of Mr. J. Needham, Bay Fortune, and is well and favorably known in that locality. MR. R. K. BRACE, of Charlottetown, who has been actively engaged for the past two years in forwarding the dairy interests of the Island, has bought the patent right on a part of Lynch's Dairy outfit for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. He had previously bought the right for the Island. The articles are the "Time-for-it" Strainer milking pail, and the Creamer "Favorite." He will begin to push their introduction here at once. He has also engaged Mr. Lynch, the inventor, to lecture on dairying in the Island next summer. From the introduction of improved utensils and enterprising means taken to educate the farmer in their use, a decided improvement in the butter placed upon the market will be looked for. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] A False Report and a Difficulty Overcome.

LONDON, Nov. 28. A Cairo despatch dated to-day, says the report of the capture of Khartoum by El Medhi's forces is unfounded. The difficulty in persuading Turkish officers ordered for service in the Sudan to accompany the expedition has been overcome, and almost the entire number have consented to join the expedition, which is under command of Baker Pasha. All the English non-commissioned officers in Egypt have volunteered to go to the front and much enthusiasm prevails among the troops. The Paris correspondent of the Times believes the difficulty between France and China will be settled by arbitration.

Agitation in Algeria.

PARIS, Nov. 28. Advice from Algeria state that there is great agitation against the native tribes, the reported success of El Medhi in the Sudan having aroused the Mussulman fanaticism. It is thought that El Medhi's emissaries are traversing Tunis. The Governor General is urging upon the French Government the necessity of retaining a large military force in Algeria.

The Shields-Globe Suit.

TORONTO, Nov. 28. Yesterday a motion was made to dismiss libel suit brought by John Shields against the Globe and others. The court allowed Shields, three weeks more to file particulars, but the Globe this morning says it will not stay muzzled any longer, and published an article repeating all its former charges against the Government in connection with section B contract.

News from the Northwest.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 28. The Manitoba and Northwest Farmers' Union was organized at Brandon on Monday. A large portion of the town of Rat Portage, 100 miles east of here was burned yesterday. Ten business houses were destroyed. The buildings were blown up with gunpowder to check the flames. The loss is not yet ascertained.

A Bastardly Attempt at Train Wrecking.

LONDON, Nov. 28. Eight blocks of stone were placed upon the railway track near Wolverhampton on Monday. It is rumored that they were placed there for the purpose of wrecking the train on which Gladstone was expected to travel.

Unseated and Disqualified.

OTTAWA, Nov. 28. Mr. Freshetto, member for Megantic in the house of Commons, has been unseated and disqualified. The mental condition of the Hon. Adam Crooks is such that his friends talk of sending him to a private asylum.

O'Donnell's Trial.

Justice Denman, of the Court of Queen's Bench, will preside at O'Donnell's trial which will begin next Friday. It is expected the trial will be concluded Saturday as only nine witnesses for the prosecution and four for the defence will be called.

Reported Conspiracy.

DUBLIN, Nov. 28. The Freeman's Journal says that within a fortnight over thirty persons have been arrested charged with conspiring to destroy the residence of a County Mayo Landlord and also with belonging to the Fenian Brotherhood.

Emperor William Speaks.

BERLIN, Nov. 28. Emperor William, at the reception given last evening to the President of the Lower House of the Prussian Diet, expressed, in strong terms, his confidence that the peace of Europe would be maintained.

Magistrates Threatening.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The Standard's correspondent at Dublin says that a number of Irish magistrates declare their intention of resigning in consequence of the suspension of Lord Rossmore.

Stanley on his Defence.

LONDON, Nov. 28. It is reported here that M. Stanley, the African explorer, intends to defend himself against the charge made by a committee of the African Society of impatience in dealing with natives.

Panic at Khartoum.

CAIRO, Nov. 28. The Greek Consul at Khartoum telegraphs that Hicks Pasha's force were surrounded near Kordafan and utterly destroyed. A panic prevails at Khartoum.

Prisoner Released.

TORONTO, Nov. 28. The Manitoba Chief of Police was released from Ontario jail at Rat Portage on Monday night by order of the Ontario Government.

St Croix Cotton Mill.

MONTREAL, Nov. 28. The St. Croix Cotton mill which recently suspended owes, it is said, \$30,000 to the Dominion Government for duties on machinery.

Shipping Disasters.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The number of shipping disasters reported during the last few days is larger than for the same time in past year.

The Lennox Election.

OTTAWA, Nov. 28. The Government Party feel badly over the result of the Lennox election and now talk of a recount.

At Work Again.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. The striking cigar box makers have gone to work again at their old wages.

MOVEMENTS OF THE FISHING FLEETS AND FISH RECEIPTS.—The receipts continue light. We notice thirty-five fishing arrivals at this port since our last issue, as follows: Fares, Grounds, Codfish, Halibut, Mackerel, lbs. bbls. 20 George's 404,000 9,500, 4 West B 37,000 450, 4 Bank habit 189,000 \$1,000, 7 Bay 2,107, 85 630,000 90,400 2,107. Other receipts 122,000 lbs pollock, 500 qtls cured hake, 73 bbls herring and 20 bbls oil. For the corresponding week of last year the receipts were 223,000 lbs codfish, 152,700 lbs halibut, 101 bris mackerel, 700 qtls mixed fish, 86,000 lbs hake, 230,000 lbs pollock, 20,000 lbs cusk, 530,000 lbs haddock and five bbls herring. Last week the receipts were 389,100 lbs codfish, 11,209 lbs halibut, 540 bris mackerel, 58,850 lbs pollock, 400 qtls codfish, and 92,000 lbs haddock.—Cape Ann Advertiser.
