Tobacco Picture Looking Brighter

Fall harvest stories are definitely improving these days, and Douglas Roloson, who grew 31 acres of tobacco at Ocean View this year, said yesterday that he finished cutting off his tobacco on Monday of this week and he didn't lose any at all to the frost which struck late in September.

"My neighbor, Albert Pauley, grew 19 acres and he also escaped loss," said Roloson, a tobacco producer, who said there did appear to be some loss at first, but it developed that he had none, and both men now have all of their crop in the kilns.

"We still had four kilns to take off after the frost struck," said Roloson, and it all came off without damage," he assured.
