Changers Overcome Bruins; Close Ground On Detroit

BOSTON (CP-AP)—The New York Ranger line of Camille Henry, Phil Goyette and Roy Gilbert, put together just six weeks ago, scored three goals Tuesday night as the Rangers defeated Boston Bruins 3-1 in a National Hockey League game here.

Henry, the lightweight left-winger, had two goals—his 22nd and 23rd of the current campaign, and Goyette picked his 15th. Gilbert picked up three assists.

Centre Goyette, acquired by the Bruins where he had languished for six seasons in the shadow of luminaries such as Rocket Richard and Jean Beliveau, has been in the top 10 among NHL scorers since his switch to Rangers, and the Bruins have been his chief victims.

His season total of 47 points, 21 have come at the Bruins—nine goals and 12 assists.

The victory boosted Rangers to within one point of the fourth place Detroit Red Wings in the battle for the final NHL playoff berth. The Rangers have lost only three of their last 13 starts in their drive to overhaul the Red Wings, who have 42 points.
