

# Horne's Rockets Capture Bowling Championship In Sudden-Death Match

Horne's Rockets, led by team captain Glen Matheson last night won the Prince Edward Island Five Pin Bowling championship at the Roll-Away Alleys by defeating the All Stars four points to one in a sudden death play-off match for the Island crown.

The Rockets took the first game of the match last night with 184 pins to spare and from then on they never looked back. The All Stars won the second game but it was a dying grasp and the Rockets came on in the final to win the match and the title.

The play-off was necessitated when the two teams bowled to a draw in the Island tournament last Saturday. Competition was keen last night, perhaps a little too keen as few of the bowlers struck the form which carried them through last week.

But it is the score that counts and when the scores were added last night it was found that the All Stars, Island champs in 1951, were lacking. The Rockets owned a match score of 3008 and the All Stars 3174.

Glen Matheson was in top form as he rolled three games of 227, 197 and 270 to rack up a total of 744 plenty good for high three honors. Jimmy Falls, also of the Rockets won high single honors with a score of 282 in the first game. Falls had a match score of 701.

Don "Duck" MacDonald was the best of the All Stars as he ag-

gregated 708 in the three games. MacDonald had games of 250, 254 and 204.

"The Old Champ" Joey MacDonald was off stride. The best that Joey could do was a three game total of 580, almost 250 below his score of last Tuesday night in the City finals. Joey's son Roy, lead-off man for the Rockets, found the Alleys more to his liking and came through with a total of 689.

With the Island title the Rockets won the large trophy donated by Reliance Garage as well as individual trophies for each team member. Other trophies were won by Earl Goss for high average, Irving MacKinnon for high single, George Schleyer for high three, and team trophies by the All Stars for high match and high string.

# McDermott Brilliant As Red Sox Win 1-0

(Associated Press) — Sawawny Mickey McDermott secured only three batters Thursday night as he pitched Boston Red Sox to a brilliant 1-0, one-hit victory over Washington Senators in a battle for second place in the American League.

Mel Hoderlein singled to right with one out in the fourth inning. McDermott's no-hitter. Hoderlein was wiped out in a double play. The only other Senator to reach base was Eddie Yost who walked to start the game.

The one-hitter was the fourth of the season in the majors. Bobby Cain of St. Louis and Bobby Feller of Cleveland each allowed only one hit in a game won by Cain 10-4 April 23. Art Houtteman of Detroit stopped Cleveland on one-hit April 26. Vergil Trucks of Detroit pitched the only no-hitter so far, beating Washington 1-0 May 15.

Porterfield, victim of Trucks' no-hitter, was the loser Thursday night. He was touched for 10 hits. The Red Sox scored the game's lone run in the sixth when Clyde Vollmer walked and third-baseman Fred Hatfield tripled.

McDermott pitched perfect ball from the fifth through the ninth. The lanky left-hander fanned seven in posting his third victory compared to two defeats. The victory enabled the Sox to break their tie with the Senators for second place.

# Consolation Daily Double Adopted

ALBANY, N. Y., May 29—(AP)—The State Harness Racing Commission has ordered the consolation daily double adopted at the seven harness tracks in New York State.

A spokesman disclosed today that the commission adopted the rule at a meeting in New York City May 8 and made it effective May 15.

Under the new system, the holder of a daily double ticket is given a "consolation" payoff if his first horse wins and the second is scratched.

Previously, the holder of such a ticket was entitled only to a refund of the price he paid for the ticket.

# Jersey Joe's Manager Demands Charles' Moustache

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 29—(AP)—The moustache of Ezzard Charles is again beginning to annoy the manager of heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott.

Felix Bocchicchio, the manager, said he will demand that Charles shave off the moustache before coming into the ring at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium June 5 for the 15-round title fight with Walcott.

When Walcott took the crown from Charles in Pittsburgh last July, Bocchicchio raised a bit of a ruckus about the moustache. The Pennsylvania Boxing Commission allowed Charles to trim it down a bit.

Then, of course, Charles was the champion. Now he's only the challenger and in the No. 2 role his wishes may be overruled.

Bocchicchio said he wants the whole thing shaved off.

"The rules of the Pennsylvania commission require all fighters to be clean-shaven in the ring," Felix explained.

The Charles camp at nearby Pleasantville was unconcerned. "He's just trying to rattle us, that's all," said Jake Mintz, co-manager of Charles. "If he insists on making an issue of it, we'll have a few things to tell the commission about Walcott too."

"Quebec is very anxious to know about the hockey plans of the Maritimes for next year," Walter Lawlor, President of the M.A.H.A. stated yesterday. The M.A.H.A. presy along with Judge J. Elliott Hudson of Halifax, President of the M.M.H.L., attended the meeting between the professionals and the C.A.H.A. in Toronto last Monday. In speaking about the outlook of Quebec hockey for next year Walter stated that it appeared to depend upon the actions of the Maritime clubs.

The Quebec clubs appear to have no intention of turning professional as long as the Maritime teams remain in Major hockey, stated the M.A.H.A. head. # Fine Weather Forecast For Big Auto Race

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29—(AP)—Bad weather, one of three things that could prevent a record-cracking 500-mile auto race Friday, probably will miss the Indianapolis motor speedway again.

The forecast is for a warm, partly cloudy Memorial Day. The start is at 11 a.m. CDT (noon EDT).

The most important American auto race, the only one that counts in the international standing, it has been postponed only once since it started in 1911.

Rain shortened the 1926 race to 400 miles and the 1950 race to 345 miles.

The other two factors that could slow the race—wrecks and engine failures—may not be so well under control.

Everybody connected with the racing classic has his fingers crossed after four straight years without a fatality in the actual race. William (Shorty) Canton of Indianapolis died in 1947.

The last of the track's 42 victims, George Metzler of Indianapolis, was fatally injured practicing for the 1949 race.

Except that the speed has increased steadily, the track has become safer. Part of the credit goes to modern tires that quickly reduce the momentum of a skidding car. Part goes to improved chassis design.

# Troops Put Down Riot In Prison Camp Compound

KOJE ISLAND, Korea, May 30—(Friday)—(AP)—About 100 British and United States troops with bayonet and tear gas Thursday raided an unruly compound containing 3,350 tough Communist prisoners, destroyed their headquarters, and emerged with Red flags and knives without spilling a drop of blood.

It was the first big show of force inside any of the 17 compounds since disorders flared early in May on this South Korean island where 80,000 prisoners of war are held.

Two hours later a U.S. soldier accidentally discharged his automatic rifle into the seething compound, killing one prisoner and wounding another.

The trouble began when guards spotted Red prisoners trying to chop a hole through an inner barrier wire fence that bars the way to an area leading to the outer gate.

Col. Henry Taylor ordered the Reds to repair the hole. When they refused, he summoned 50 battle-seasoned U.S. troops.

The infantrymen, wearing gas masks and with bayonets fixed to their rifles, then moved in with tear gas, driving the Red prisoners from the fence.

Behind the flying wedge, more than 50 soldiers from the King's Shropshire Light Infantry moved in and began tearing down their

command post and nearby dispensary.

The 2,700 Red officers and 650 men of the compound stood back, chanted slogans, jeered and sang. One prisoner mounted a rostrum and declared the incident was a rehearsal for the third world war.

The first British wrecking crew was relieved by 65 more British troops who had been taking riot-control training. These troops completed the demolition job. They brought out knives, Red flags and medical supplies, blankets and pictures, most of which had been hidden under the floors of the two shacks.

The British troops also found maps of Kojé Island and "other intelligence material," Taylor reported.

Taylor said authorities had been wanting to get rid of the buildings for a long time because they kept guards from seeing what was going on in compound 66.

# Phillies Defeat N. Y. Giants 6-5 To End 7-Game Winning Streak

Philadelphia Phillies, taking advantage of loose fielding derailed the pace-setting New York Giants 6-5 Thursday to end a seven-game New York winning streak.

Brooklyn's runner-up Dodgers, smarting from three straight defeats at the hands of the Giants, rebounded with a 7-3 triumph over Boston Braves to pull to within 1-2 games of their rivals.

In the only other National League game, Pittsburgh Pirates owned Cincinnati Reds 4-2. In the American League, the front-running Cleveland Indians trounced Detroit 11-4 and New York Yankees nipped Philadelphia Athletics 3-2.

Two tainted runs in the fifth inning and Smokey Burgess' two-run single in the seventh ruined the Giants.

Philadelphia trailed 3-2 until the fifth when they took the lead for keeps. A passed ball by catcher Wes Westrum admitted the first run and an error by second baseman Davey Williams let in the second. Burgess singled with the bases loaded in the seventh off Monte Kennedy, fifth Giant pitcher.

The Giants almost pulled it out of the fire in the ninth, scoring twice against Jim Konstanty and

Brooklyn's bats, muffed in the Giant series broke their silence against the Braves. The Dodgers shelled three Boston pitchers for 11 hits including four home runs and three doubles.

Andy Pafko, Jackie Robinson, Pee Wee Reese and Gil Hodges socked homers. Pafko's blast was his ninth of the season.

Lanky Chris Van Cuyk opened for Brooklyn and scored his fourth victory but needed help from rookie Joe Black, who took over in the sixth.

Little Murry Dickson entered the win column for the first time since April 3 as he pitched Pittsburgh's woeful Pirates to a fourth hit triumph over Harry Perkowski and the Reds.

Dickson didn't permit a hit until the fifth and had a one-hitter going until the eighth when the Reds scored twice on a home run by Roy McMillan, single by Bob Borowski and double by Bobby Adams. Ralph Kiner, intentionally passed his first three times up, clinched the game with a two-run homer in the seventh. The blow was Kiner's fifth.

Harry Simpson and Al Rosen were big wheels in Cleveland's victory over Detroit. Simpson drove home five runs on a grand-slam homer and three singles and Rosen batted in four on a pair of doubles and a single.

The Indians snapped a 4-4 tie with two runs in the seventh and sewed it up with five in the eighth. Simpson whacked his jackpot blow against Ken Johnson, former National Leaguer who was making his first appearance of the season. Bob Feller went all the way for the Indians.

Error Is Costly

An eighth-inning error by Billy Hitchcock, filling in at first base for Ferris Fain, enabled the Yankees to down the A's.

Hitchcock fumbled Yogi Berra's grounder and Phil Rizuto scored from second base on the boot to break a 2-2 tie.

Vic Raschi went the distance for the Yankees and the triumph was his 23rd in 23 lifetime decisions over the Athletics.
