# South Viet and Chinese Siding Towards Peace De Gaulle Given Rousing Cheers

CARACAS (AP) — Thousands of Venezuelans gave President Charles de Gaulle a rousing welcome Monday as he opened his drive to spread France's influence in Latin America.

Several persons were injured when two trucks filled with photographers collided after de Gaulle drove wreaths on the tombs in the Venezuelan pantheon. A soldier and a bystander were sent to hospital and several photographers were bruised.

The accident did not delay de Gaulle's progress through the country.

The extraordinary security measures were taken against the possibility the anti-Gaullist French secret army might make an attempt against de Gaulle's life or that the Armed Forces of National Liberation, Venezuela's pro-Cuban terrorist organization might strike in an attempt to embarrass the Venezuelan government.

Jet fighters and helicopters roared overhead. Troops and police kept watch on the de Gaulle motorcade from rooftops along the route.
