I. in 1899 he started his own grocery business. He was predeceased by his wife, Mabel, in 1949, and by a sister, Sara, former Superintendent of Nurses at the General Hospital. Surviving him are two sons and a daughter. The late Mr. MacDonald was a cousin of Mr. A. M. Wright of Montague.

Visiting British

"Lest you think that everything in the garden was lovely in Red China, let me tell you that the smiling and friendly officials who shepherded us around with such suavity for several weeks grew positively menacing when I asked if they would pose for a snapshot with some of my colleagues of the British press."

"In fact, there was a bit of a scene. 'Why? Oh, because communism has the same effect anywhere you care to dip your toe into it—a good Communist can't let himself be photographed 'fraternizing' with

the Western Imperialist Fascist reptiles."

LABOR HERALD SAYS Deryck Winteron of the Daily Herald, an organ of the British Labor movement, described the group's departure from Red China: "Formalities at the frontier were smooth, but took about two hours. Chinese customs men gave our luggage one of the most casual inspections ever... a few minutes later we were on a train with British chocolate and cigars instead of chicken legs and tin dishes of stew."

"There are an enormous number of workers in the fields in China. One sees more agricultural laborers in four hours than one would see in Britain in 10 days."

The Communist Daily Worker correspondent found China a land of progress and happiness.
