

# Chicago Halfback Sayers Beats Off Two Contenders

CHICAGO (AP) — Gale Sayers, Chicago Bears' sensational halfback, isn't one to lie low when presented with a challenge.

That Sayers will be the National Football League's top rookie of 1965 was all but assured after he streaked for six touchdowns in a record performance Sunday which gave the Bears a 61-20 victory over San Francisco.

Sayers' six touchdowns tied the NFL single game mark, gave him a record of 21 touchdowns for the season—bettering the mark of 20 shared by Lesie Moore of Baltimore Colts and Jimmy Brown of Cleveland Browns—and his 336 yards gained on rushing, pass receiving and punt returns set another record.

Two weeks ago Sayers had not convinced everyone he should be rookie of the year.

**BILLED AS BATTLE**

When the Bears invaded New York to meet the Giants, the game was billed as a battle to decide the rookie honors between Sayers and New York halfback Tucker Fredrickson.

Sayers scored two touchdowns in leading the Bears to a 36-14 triumph. He gained 11 yards in 13 rushes and picked up 24 more in passes caught. Fredrickson was held to 37 yards in 13 rushes.

Sunday, Sayers had to prove himself again, this time against Ken Willard, San Francisco's powerful fullback who in his first year was among the league's leading rushers.

Sayers turned in a performance which Bear owner-coach George Halas called "The greatest I have seen in my 40 years in the league."

Willard carried 10 times for 24 yards and added another 22 on three pass receptions.

Sayers not only outdid Willard but practically the entire San Francisco offense by taking a pass for 80 yards on one touchdown and romping 83 yards for another on a punt return. His other scores came on runs of 21, seven, 50 and one yard.

# Tourney Of Champs Slated For January

TORONTO (CP)—Champions from three countries will be among eight rinks entered in the 1965 Tournament of Champions bonspiel at Maple Leaf Gardens, scheduled for Jan. 11-14.

Bud Somerville's world champion foursome from Superior, Wis., has entered the third annual curling event along with Scotland's championship rink skipped by Chuck Hay of Perth and Terry Braunstein's Canadian champions from Winnipeg.

They will be joined by Ontario champion Jack Polyan's rink from Kirkland Lake and three returnees from last year's event—defending champion Hector Gervais of Edmonton, runner-up Doug Cameron of Charlottetown, and the Ernie Richardson rink of Regina.

An eighth rink will be elected from one of eight Metropolitan Toronto area rinks entered in a

double-knockout bonspiel to be played next weekend.

Tournament chairman Doug Maxwell said Monday the Scots have agreed to accept token prizes only in the event they win the bonspiel.

U.S. entries, in order to retain amateur status within their organization, may accept prizes up to a value of \$100 a man while Ontario teams are limited to \$150 a man.

As in last year's scheduling, the teams will meet each other once in a round-robin affair with the top four rinks reaching the semi-finals. The opening round is scheduled for 8 p.m. Tuesday. The rinks will each play three rounds Wednesday and Thursday at 11:30 a.m., 4 p.m. and 8 p.m.

Friday's semi-final play starts at 11:30 a.m. with the two finalists meeting at 8 p.m.

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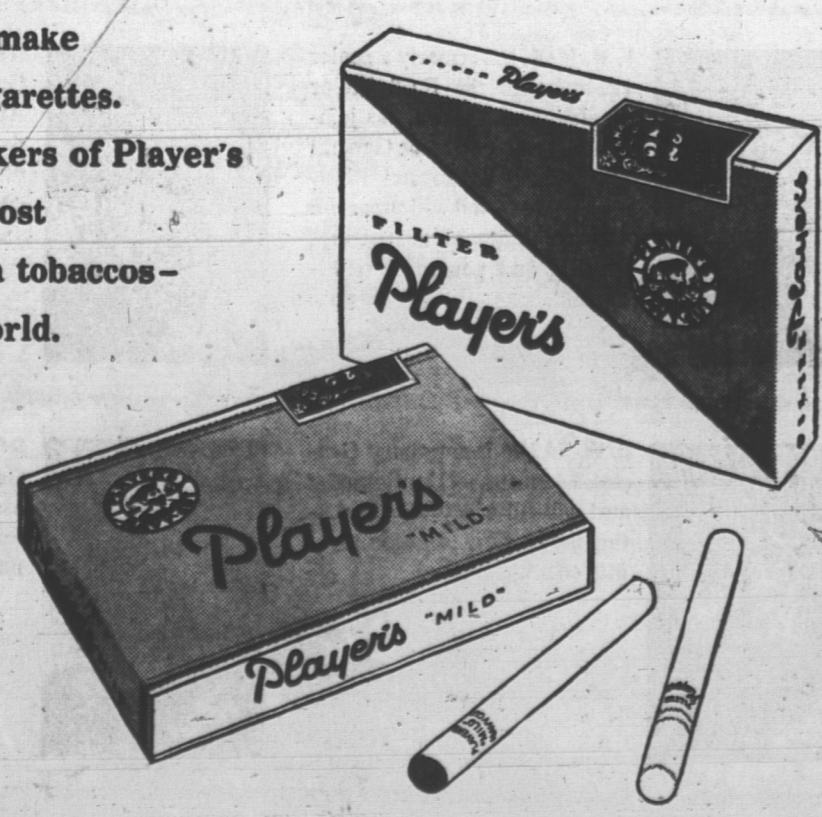

# RCAF Appeals Decision; Royals Manager Disturbed

Sandy Frizzell, manager of Sandy's Royals, hasn't received full payment for the \$500 awarded to his club at the annual meeting of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association last September.

The Royals captured the Maritime Intermediate hockey crown last spring, but missed two playoff games when Summerside's RCAF aggregation, winners of the Prince County Hockey League and the New Brunswick provincial champions, Campbellton Tigers refused to meet: the Royals.

Summerside's RCAF team and Campbellton failed to meet playoff dates set down by the MAHA at the previous annual meeting. These clubs offered no protest at the meeting, but ignored the

playoff dates in the spring. The MAHA fined Campbellton and Summerside \$250 each for failing to compete against the Royals for the Maritime crown.

Campbellton have paid the fine and Summerside sent a check to the MAHA, but launched an appeal against the decision.

Mr. Frizzell is to receive the \$250 from Campbellton in the near future, but when he (Frizzell) inquired as to where the other \$250 was to be paid by MAHA Secretary Registrar, H. T. Dowell, Middleton, N.S., that he couldn't have it at this time.

The MAHA spokesman informed Sandy of the RCAF appeal

and told him he couldn't receive payment until a decision was reached on the appeal. The appeal will be heard at the next annual meeting.

In the meantime the \$250 from the Summerside club which has been paid to the MAHA is deposited in the MAHA current account pending the outcome of the appeal.

**MANAGER DISTURBED**

The manager of the Charlottetown team was enraged when he received this information. Sandy said last night: "A little more than a year ago my club was fined \$1600 for failing to take a full team to Windsor for a playoff game. Before my team stepped on the ice the following year I handed the MAHA a cheque which covered the fine. Now with my team expecting a \$250 cheque which was awarded to us, partly to compensate for the gates that we lost in last spring's playoffs, I find that the MAHA wants to hold the money in order that they can see how an appeal turns out at the next annual meeting. The decision was made at the last meeting where everyone had an opportunity to state their views so why should any organization contradict their own views?"

Frizzell added "I didn't want to hurt anybody last season as I well know the expense involved in running a hockey club, but if I don't receive payment in the near future I plan to re-open the issue at the next meeting. I definitely will not be satisfied

with a \$250 fine. I think a figure like \$1000 will be what I will go after if I do not receive payment soon."

He concluded by saying that he believed in fair play and that when he was fined for failing to ice a full team he complied without question. Now when his team is awarded a fine of \$250 he can't get his hands on the money.

The Royals downed the Shearwater Flyers with ease last spring to capture the Maritime Intermediate Hockey Championship.

# Paul Hornung Comes Off Bench To Score 5 TDs

NEW YORK (AP)—If Paul Hornung could score five touchdowns against Baltimore Colts, why had he been riding the Green Bay Packers bench?

Vince Lombardi, coach and general manager of the Packers, grappled with the question Sunday after Green Bay vaulted into first place in the Western Conference of the National Football League by defeating the Colts 42-2.

"Paul just hadn't been running well," Lombardi told reporters. "He played some against Los Angeles two weeks ago but he wasn't helping us much. So I had to sit him down last week against Minnesota."

"This time we decided to go with all the veterans to prove you fellows were wrong when you said we were getting old. Paul is a great pressure player. The bigger the game the better he plays."

In the first 12 games of the season, Hornung carried the ball only 66 times and gained but 231 yards. The three-time league scoring champion had caught only 16 passes for 211 yards and scored three touchdowns.

Hornung, who soon will be 30, said he had pulled a groin muscle in the first of two recent games with Minnesota Vikings but had not been hurting last week when Lombardi sat him out against the Vikings.

"Sure, I wanted to play," said Hornung. "After eight years you kind of take it for granted that you will play. But he has been using Tom Moore, Elijah Pitts and me. Being benched didn't surprise me. You go with the guys who are winning. I'd be silly if I said I didn't want to play. I know, I can do a lot better than I have been doing."

# Paul Richards Has No Plans

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Paul Richards, dismissed as general manager of National Baseball League Houston Astros, says he has no immediate plans but those close to him feel he will be back in baseball soon in some capacity.

Richards, who said he had not been fired before in his 39 years as a player-manager and general manager, was given his walking papers Sunday by Astro owner Roy Hofheinz.

Richards succeeded Gabe Paul as general manager of the Houston club in 1961. Paul left Cincinnati Reds to take the Houston position but resigned for personal reasons

# Montreal Habs Dispel Doubts

To score a goal must give a player a thrill. To score a winning one is better still. Then Jean Beliveau must be a thrill-shocked player for on the weekend, the most crucial one of the NHL season to date, two of his three goals earned the Habs two games and a big four point lead in the Prince of Wales trophy race.

Their weekend performance is ample proof just why the Canadiens are the best hockey team in the world, and why the Black Hawks have to be the greatest paper tigers in the world. The Habs proved that they could outskate, outshoot and outscore the Tribe and as a result they held a comfortable margin today.

Big factor in the brace of wins was coach Toe Blake's strategy to play Henri Richard, Claude Provost and Gilles Tremblay against Bobby Hull, Phil Esposito and Chico Maki. It made for a lot of chuckles Saturday evening to see players flying over the boards at every opportunity so that these two lines were facing one another at all times. Each time the Tribes line appeared the Habs would ice the puck to get the opposing line into action.

Another feature of the tilts, although not a new one to hockey supporters was the power play. These two clubs have by far and away the two best in the NHL and any time a player leaves the ice in a crucial match such as these two, it spells only trouble for the short-handed team. The Habs got the better of the power play opportunities as they won Saturday evening's match on such a goal and then scored three on Sunday evening and went on to take the second match 5-3. Why is the Habs power play so much better? Several reasons when they are facing Chicago.

The Habs power play is better, first because it relies on teamwork and players are not loath to pass the puck to any one of the other four in order that they get a shot. Yvon Cournoyer, is played exclusively on the power play and has figured in the greater part of the goals scored so that it seems as if the power play specialist is starting to become a fixture of pro hockey. Then too the Canadiens have a better penalty killing unit than Chicago in two respects.

When the Hawks get penalized Ray goes with his best to kill off the time (Mikata for example) but the Habs have Jim Roberts and Dave Balon to do the honors. This gives the big guns an opportunity to rest and it does make a big difference when the pace is as torrid as when these two clubs meet.

Chicago defeats its own purpose on the manpower advantage in that it seems to think that Bobby Hull is the only man that is capable of putting the puck in the net. How wrong could they be. Hull missed three straight shots on Gump Worsley Sunday night and after each shot the unit as a whole worked like dogs to get the puck to him again. A wasted effort no doubt. Why not give the damn puck to Mikata who has proved in the past that he is more than capable of putting the puck in the net. These two big guns seem to be out to hit each others throats and it is really hurting the clubs chances as proved over the weekend. Nevertheless even if the club started playing their best hockey they still wouldn't be able to down the "flying Frenchmen", the elite of the worlds fastest game.

Another Baltimore quarterback hit the dust Sunday afternoon and with Gary Cuzzo went the Colts' hopes for a second straight Western division title. Bert Starr, Paul Horung and Jim Taylor combined to demolish the first place club and took over the top rung themselves. They lead the league by half a game. With one game remaining the Packers lead the hoop by half a game and if they win on next Sunday the title will be theirs. That should be some championship game with Taylor and Brown, the two best runners in the world, lining up opposite one another. It is a shame that the Chicago Bears are not in the final game for they are undisputedly the strongest club in the west at the present moment. Rudy Butsch is the top QB in the league as far as statistics are concerned and that sensational rookie Gail Sayers seems to be the most explosive runner to hit the NFL grid in some while. Sayers set a NFL record for the most majors in one season in his freshman year. I wonder what we can look for his second.

The Halifax Junior Canadiens hosted a Junior A team from Cornwall Ontario over the weekend and whipped them in two games 5-2 and 5-3. However this club was from the central Junior league and this loop is not as half as strong as the OHA Junior club. Bossy, coach of the Habs, says that his charges should be ready to beat the OHA clubs such as the Montreal Junior Habs or the Toronto Marlies in the space of three years. Drea malong coach. It is not too likely that any outstanding material that he does get will remain in the Maritimes when they can be playing a far superior brand of hockey in the top junior league in the country.

# POLICE GET RAISE

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—A salary increase of \$500 annually has been accepted by the negotiating committee of the Windsor police Association. The pay boost brings the annual wage of a first-class police constable to \$6,300 from \$5,700
