Pure Bred Stock Raising.

Of all the men of business in this Province who have devoted their attention to agriculture, not one has expended more money or exhibited more practical ability in the conduct of the operations of the farm than Mr. Benjamin Heartz, of this city.

The stables are large and new. There are three horse stables, two of them about a hundred feet in length, filled up from end to end with box stalls for stallions and breeding mares.

Mr. Heartz has sixty horses—young and old—consisting of pure bred Percherons and grade Percherons, and very finely bred trotting stock.

Mr. Heartz has six stallions and six very fine pure-bred mares, with foals, or to foal, from Duroc and John C. Altogether, he expects to have, this spring, between pure-breds and grades, twelve foals, of the Percheron breed.

The trotting horses comprise three very fine standard bred and registered stallions, two years of age, and a number of standard bred mares, and mares which breed standard bred stock entitled to registry in the stud book.

In respect to cattle Mr. Heartz deals solely in pure-bred Holstein-Friesian's. The fame of these cattle is world-wide. They mature early, grow large, and are the deepest milkers.

City Council Meeting.

The Council met at ten o'clock last evening, Mayor Haviland presiding. There was a full attendance of members.

Councillor Morris moved, seconded by Councillor Byrne, that \$100 be given to the Queen Square Garden Fund.

Councillor Morris moved, seconded by Councillor Morris, that Drs. Johnson and Conroy be appointed vaccinators for the city.

Councillor Morris moved, seconded by Councillor Byrne, that the Mayor be authorized to issue debentures to the amount of \$2500, payable in 20 years, and bearing interest at 5 per cent.

Councillor Douse, chairman of the street committee, said that Black Sam's Bridge would be looked after at once.

His Worship also submitted a letter from the Sanitary Officer stating that he had visited and inspected the premises of Robert Bridges, on Hillsborough street, and found them in a very dirty and unhealthy condition.

The Recorder said that the letter had no right to be submitted to the Board at all. The proper course for the Sanitary Officer to have pursued would be to have Mr. Bridges arraigned before him as Stipendiary Magistrate.

Councillor McCarron called attention to the manure-heaps along the roadside, near the cemeteries, and asked if something could not be done in the matter of their removal, as they were a great nuisance.

Board of Health Meeting.

The Board of Health met last evening at 8 o'clock, Hon. T. H. Haviland presiding. Every member of the Board was present, including the Water Commissioners who are ex-officio members.

The Chairman, in opening, explained that the meeting was called for the purpose of passing certain rules and regulations for the Board and the guidance of its Health Officer.

Dr. Johnson then submitted the rules and regulations in question. He explained that they were culled from the rules governing the New Brunswick Board, which, in turn, were taken almost verbatim from the Quebec rules.

On motion, it was ordered that the rules and regulations, with certain sections of the Public Health Act as an appendix, be published in pamphlet form for the information of citizens generally.

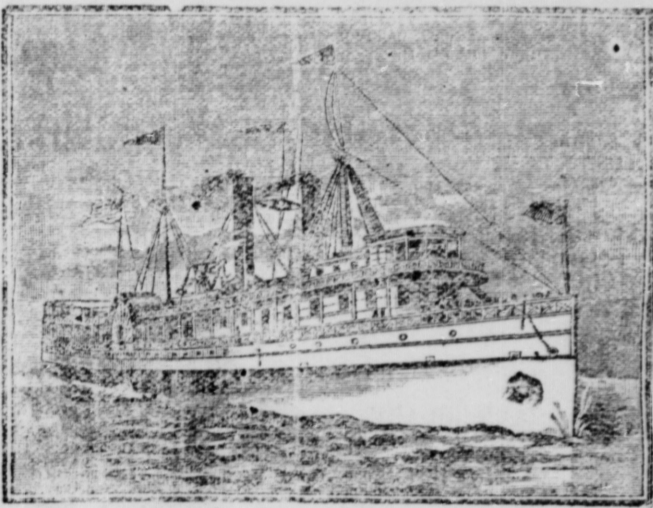
