DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Private Bills. OTTAWA, March 1. A number of private Bills were introduced in the House of Commons yesterday.

King's County Election Case.

In the Commons yesterday, Mr. Cameron M. P., Huron, introduced the King's County election case of McDonald vs. Robertson, by moving a resolution that Dr. Robertson is entitled to the seat. Sir John McDonald said he thought the case should be referred to the Committee of privileges and elections. The debate on Mr. Cameron's motion was then adjourned until to-day.

Contracts and Lumber Duties.

Mr. Casgrain, M. P., yesterday introduced a bill concerning contracts. Mr. Royal, M. P., asked the removal of duties on lumber imported into Manitoba.

German Steamship Line.

Mr. Kranz, M. P., asked the Government, yesterday, to subsidize a steamship line between Germany and Canada, to assist in German immigration.

Frank Byrne's Arrest.

PARIS, March 2. The French Radicals show great opposition to the extradition of Frank Byrne by the British Government.

Andalusian Outrages.

MADRID, March 2. A great many socialist outrages have taken place in Andalusia within the past few days. The police are active, and over three hundred arrests were made yesterday. Among the leading socialists is the ex-Mayor of Malaga.

[A despatch of the 25th ult., from Madrid] says the existence of secret societies has been discovered in Andalusia, having for their object the extermination of the bourgeoisie and landowners. Members of the society are compelled to execute all orders received from their chiefs under penalty of death. The Imparcial published a detailed account of the discovery in Andalusia of the societies whose aim is to destroy the rights of property and exterminate the Bourgeoisie landowners. The Socialist societies are said to number a thousand, the member including persons of high standing. The Government is resolved to take energetic measures for their suppression.

The Andalusian societies were organized by a member of the Jerez branch, who declined the task of murdering, and its Master first revealed to plot. The arrests at Jerez, Cadiz, and Seville exceed 500. Seven informers in different towns have exposed the existence of a completely organized society, with funds, foreign correspondence, and secret tribunals.]

Telegraph Notes.

A report from Michigan states that seventy lumbermen in the northern pincer were recently killed by strychnine being accidentally put in bread instead of soda. It lacks confirmation.

A great consternation prevails in Milwaukee on account of a threatened water famine. The inlet of the water works is clogged up with ice and the reservoir contains barely half a day's supply.

Baron Nordenskjold, Swedish explorer, has notified the Dutch Minister at Stockholm, that he intends to claim the reward of 25,000 guilders offered in 1595 for the discovery of the Northeast passage.

A popular ferment at Calavia Sicily, resulted from the alteration of the railway tariff affecting the sulphur trade. The situation is becoming grave. The manufacture and a regiment of troops have arrived to maintain order.

Gilbert L. Crowell, president of the Empire Mining Company of Utah, is a defaulter for over \$60,000, having abstracted from the trust funds of the Tolman estate left in his hands as agent. He is now lying sick at Arlington N. J. It is thought the Tolman family will not proceed against him.

The brigantine Lorne, owned and commanded by Capt. Charles Pye, arrived at Halifax on the 27th ult., from Havana, with a cargo of sugar for the N. S. Sugar Refinery, making of the remarkably quick passage of 12 days. The Lorne has always had the reputation of being a very fast sailer.

Brigt. Elsie, Dunn, from Quebec Nov. 10 via North Sydney Dec. 9, for Buenos Ayres, has put into Aracaty, with loss of stanchions and bulwarks, deck swept, leaking badly, and is expected to become a total wreck.

Brigt. Mary S. Gibson, McLeod from Baltimore for Antwerp, was also fallen in with in distress by steamer Boyne. Owing to the fearful weather prevailing at the time (Feb. 15) the Boyne was unable to render her any assistance.

SHIP WALLACE DISMANTLED.—Mr. G. R. I left her 18th. No mention above deck.

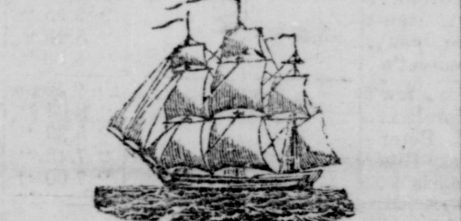

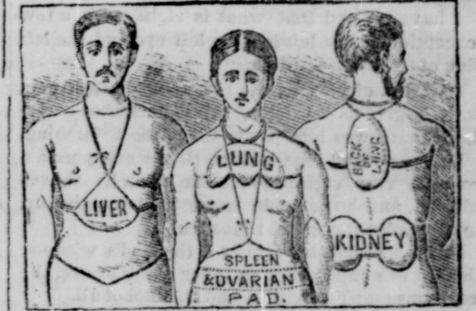
