A BOMBARDED CITY—It may be interesting, just now, to know that a bombarded city is not, after all, such a dangerous place. During the siege of Paris it took an average of a hundred shells to kill a single man; the Germans poured nearly two hundred thousand projectiles into Strasburg at a loss of only three hundred lives, or at the rate of one death for every 666 shells, while during the bombardment of Belfort a hundred thousand shells killed and wounded only sixty men.
