

# United Church Views Are Given Gordon Commission

OTTAWA (CP) — The United Church of Canada said Monday the big auto plant strikes in Ontario have hurt the little man and that the right to strike should be "re-examined."

In the first appearance of a religious body before the Gordon economic commission, the United Church urged also that the government help re-united working mothers with their children by raising family allowances so that mothers can stay home.

It suggested, too, that the commission make a thorough study of the impact of liquor sales, gambling and sexual vice on economic life; that the economy be kept free of influences which would exalt unduly the power of large corporations; and that the price of food be kept at a "fair price."

Touching on the labor issue, Dr. J.R. Mutchmor, secretary of the United Church board of evangelism and social service, said he believes Canada has been chosen as the grounds for industrial conflict because this is a presidential election year and it would not be "appropriate" to have such conflict in the United States.

Three recent strikes in the Ontario automotive industry have hurt both employer and employee, Dr. Mutchmor said.

### MEANT HARDSHIP

"These strikes also meant loss and hardship to many feeder plants whose employees received no strike pay. Likewise, many little people, such as milk men, bread men and corner store men, have been hurt in places such as Windsor and Oshawa.

"To many it has seemed that On-

tario has been chosen as the battleground for long and costly strikes by both the leaders of industry and labor in the automotive business. If this be true, the United Church would urge that the right to strike, particularly in large-scale North American developed industries, be re-examined."

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—Canadian director George Burt of United Auto Workers (CIO - CCL) said Monday the United Church of Canada is "taking responsibility that doesn't belong to it" in commenting on recent auto strikes before the Gordon economic commission.

Mr. Burt, who said the church should "talk less and pray more" when it commented on the recent record-breaking General Motors strike, said it is discussing "something it knows nothing about" in its representations to the commission on the right to strike.

# Agree With West Germany On Care Of War Graves

BONN (Reuters)—Countries of the British Commonwealth and West Germany today signed two agreements here on the maintenance of war graves, cemeteries and war memorials in West Germany and France.

Both agreements deal with the war graves of Britain, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India and Pakistan in West Germany, and with the maintenance of German war graves in Commonwealth military cemeteries in France. France was also a signatory to the second agreement. West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano said in a brief address after the signing ceremony West Germany would "do all in her power for the dignified maintenance of war graves on her territory."

# Announce Name Of Fourth R.C.A.F. Pilot Killed

OTTAWA (CP) — The RCAF has announced FO Joseph Dale McLarty, 25, formerly of Dawson Creek, B.C., was among four Ca-

nadian pilots killed over France Friday in a four-plane collision of Sabre jets.  
Names of the other three had been released earlier.  
The other airmen were FO John H. Adams, 24, of Winnipeg; FO Frederick Karl Axtell, 24, of London, and FO Edward Welters, 24, of Kelowna, B.C.  
FO McLarty listed his next-of-kin as his mother, Mrs. Margaret McLarty of Dawson Creek.

He joined the RCAF at Edmonton in 1951 and won his wings in 1952.  
After serving with a jet squadron at Bagotville, Que., he went overseas in August, 1953.  
Funeral services for the four pilots are to be held Tuesday at the RCAF station at Baden-Soellingen.
