Notes of the Week.

For a Government so fiercely republican, the present Administration in France is having a great deal of trouble over the Imperial and Royal Princes. This is only one of many recent signs that the stability of the French Republic is not so assured as some patriots could wish.

But however much the country may now lean towards the Bonapartist view of affairs, Prince Napoleon does not seem to possess the qualifications of a great revolutionist. To issue a polite, but over-assuming manifesto, flying gently but directly in the face of an ardent Republic Ministry, and then to sit quietly at home in a city mansion, has never yet been the way to win an Empire successfully.

But it is not only Imperial Princes who are exciting the French Republic. On Sunday last it was officially announced that three Royal Dukes, of the House of Orleans, had retired from the French Army, namely the Duc d'Aumale, the Duc de Chartres, and Duc d'Alencon.

The cleverest of all French Princes is, perhaps, the Duc d'Aumale, the fourth son of Louis Philippe. He is not only a skilful politician, but a deep scholar; and under both Napoleon III. and the Republic, he has proved himself a true patriot.

In Russia a large number of socialist students have been arrested, and it is stated that the authorities have received letters containing threats to blow up the Kremlin at Moscow, where the Czar is to be crowned. According to late advices a search has been made, but nothing indicating preparations for the destruction of the palace revealed.

The week has not developed anything very startling in Great Britain.

The Kilmainham trial is still pending, and we are told that other secret investigations are being made. The Press and People have been discussing Parnell's speech; and the feeling is general that, as a defence of the Land League against the grave charges of Mr. Forster, it was not satisfactory.

Further particulars concerning the "Great International Fisheries Exhibition," to be opened at South Kensington, on the first of May, have been published. The exhibition will remain open for six months. All the space has been applied for and assigned to the various countries who will exhibit.

The winter in the Mother Country has been unusually tempestuous. Shipping and agriculture have suffered much; and the outlook for the underwriter and the farmer is not bright.

Manitoba suffers a monetary stringency—the result mainly of over-speculation in real estate. A year ago, business was "on the jump" in Winnipeg, and a thousand dollars were considered "a mere nothing."

The unfortunate collapse of the Syndicate scheme is occupying the attention of the weak men who control public affairs in Nova Scotia. There can hardly be a doubt that had Mr. Holmes remained at the head of affairs, the bargain would have been consummated.

In the Provincial Legislature of New Brunswick, party lines are by no means tightly drawn. For some years, indeed, the Government of the Province was carried on on the "no party" plan advocated by Mr. Goldwin Smith.

The Queen's County election case is over at last; and the comments, and the decision of the Supreme Court of Appeal

make a sufficient answer to the remarks of our correspondent "Lib-Con." Mr. Brecken has been declared "duly elected" by Mr. Returning Officer Callbeck, by Mr. Justice Peters, and by the highest Judicial authority in Canada; and, surely THE EXAMINER was right in saying that he was "duly elected."

In Parliament, the affairs of the Island have received some attention; and a Committee has been struck to ascertain the means whereby more continuous communication with the mainland may be afforded.

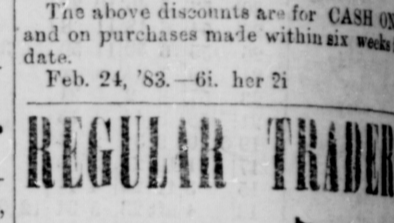
