British Columbia Potato Troubles

British Columbia Potato Growers are this fall suffering from the same type of competition from the United States as Eastern producers ran into last spring. Eastern Potato Growers who have for years enjoyed a substantial market in the States will quite properly view with some concern the view from British Columbia move to impose restrictions on United States potatoes.

The western province does not enjoy any large market in the States and for this reason views with resentment the dumping of the product at fire sale prices, in their domestic market. There will likely be some difficulty in reconciling Eastern and Western views on this matter and in particular reconciling the Western view point with the recommendation made by the Canadian Federation last March to the Dominion Cabinet. Recommendation: "We Recommend" that when trade agreements are again being discussed, a very careful re-consideration be given to our trade arrangements on potatoes between Canada and the U. S. to the end that every effort be made to institute a minimum reciprocal tariff rate agreement on potatoes without quotas between this country and the U. S., P. E. I. and N. B. growers are inclined to view with alarm any move to get tough with the U. S. fearing still further restrictions on our seed business, a portion of the trade has even expressed fears that the present agreement which guarantees an initial price might lead to retaliatory action, these fears we feel are groundless as in all likelihood there is a far greater prospect of Maine dumping its supplies in our markets than vice versa.

Opportunities

Available to young farm people wishing to enter the N. S. Agricultural College are scholarships provided by Maritime Co-op Services. In addition supplementary assistance is also available from the Provincial Dept. of Education.

Rural Electrification

In November 1944 an Economic Survey of P. E. I. prepared by Dr. J. E. Lattimer among many other things referred as follows to the question of Electrification "Probably the greatest benefit could be provided rural districts by complete rural electrification. The word complete is used deliberately. Those living where electricity cannot be provided should not be encouraged to remain there. Certainly no farms should be resettled where this convenience is not present or in prospect. This is not a new proposal. It is already being considered generally. With the provision of rural electrification many other conveniences would follow." In spite of the doctor's opinion that people should not be asked to live on a farm without power or light nor should farms without these advantages be resettled nine years later after a relative prosperous decade we still find many of our most progressive farmers still bound to the inconvenience of unnecessarily laborious methods and hampered by the inferior illumination.

Says Anglican Church Missed Bus Years Ago

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., (CP)—The Anglican church "missed the bus" years ago by not recognizing the need of Canadian Indians for a native ministry, says Frank Anfield, church superintendent of Indian affairs at Prince Rupert, B. C. At a joint meeting here Wednesday of the executive council of the General Synod and board of

management of the Missionary Society, Mr. Anfield said: "Unless the Indians raise their own clergy, teachers and nurses, they won't have any because we apparently are unable to supply them." Several speakers said that various evangelistic sects have recently entered the Indian mission field. It was announced that a commission will be set up to study the Indian problem. The week-long meetings continued Wednesday and a gift by an anonymous donor of \$50,000 to raise stipends of the clergy was announced. Other highlights of the session: The church decided to take no action in claiming compensation

for war losses of church property in China and Japan. Approved a special Arctic allowance of \$400 a year for married men and \$200 a year for single men. GIANT PLANT PORT ADELAIDE, Australia, (CP)—A new sulphuric acid plant being built here will be one of the largest in the world. The plant, to cost \$5,000,000, will use British and Australian machinery. Princeton in British Columbia was named in honor of the visit of the Prince of Wales, later Edward VIII, to Canada.


