WEDDING BELLS.—On the evening of Wednesday, the 20th inst., a large company assembled at the residence of Peter Warren, Esq., Warren Cove, North River, to witness the marriage of his youngest daughter, Bessie, to Mr. Richard Henderson of Kingston. The knot was tied by Rev. F. D. Davison. The bride was attended by Miss Tillie Boulter of Tryon and the happy bridegroom was supported by Spurgeon Warren, brother of the bride. The bride was one of the most popular young ladies of North River and will be greatly missed in her home and in the choir, of which she has been a member for some years. She was the recipient of many beautiful presents.

The old hospital still blockades Water street. It came up before the police court Thursday as a public nuisance. Mr. Connolly says it would cost less to tear it down than to cut it in two pieces, as he would have to pay for the removal of one half over the amount for which he let the contract, and it would be another month at least before the street would be clear of it. Mr. Arthur Peters appeared on behalf of the defendant, and said that not one tree would be destroyed by the removal of the building along Water street, and that not one resident objected to the house being moved along that street. Still, Mr. Ings is only one who objects. Mr. Hales makes only two and Mr. Archibald makes only three. Mr. Connolly objects to cutting it in two, as the city council objects to its removal, and there it stands an eye-sore to citizens and a laughing stock for strangers. However, his honor's decision this morning may alter the case. It came out in the examination of the City Surveyor, who granted the license for the removal of that official had never examined the place at all, his explanation being that he supposed no man would be fool enough to try to move a place without finding out whether it could be done or not.

FIRE rum does not satisfy even the rum-sellers. It seems almost an impossibility for them to keep within the limits of the law. On Thursday, Wm. Larter was before the court for violation of the Liquor Regulation Act. Marshall Cameron swore that on the 6th July he and Officer Campbell visited Larter's bar and noticed two doors behind the counter. He asked Larter where the doors led to. Larter told him that the doors were locked and that he had them shined so that they could not be opened. On the 14th the Marshall again visited Larter's and one of the doors was standing open. On the 20th he was passing Larter's and went in to examine the door, and found the shell nailed on. Larter was put on the witness stand and swore that he had no intention of breaking the law and did not know whether he had done so or not. He also said he had carried only one bucket of water through the door. Mr. Archibald, on behalf of the defendant, said the Act required one entrance into the public street, but there was nothing in the Act to show that the proprietor of a bar cannot have a door for his own private use. His Honor said there was only one interpretation to the law. As he understood it, there could be only one door in a barroom, and that door must open into the public street. There must be no private door for proprietor, guest, friend or customer. He accordingly fined Larter \$25 and costs are one month's imprisonment. Larter paid the fine.

BISHOP COURTNEY has issued an appeal to the members of the Church of England in Nova Scotia on behalf of the Church in St. John's, Nfld. He says 'the Bishop of Newfoundland telegraphs that the cathedral, the Bishop's house, the clergy house, Sunday and Day schools, Synod hall, and the orphanage are all destroyed; and, besides, many churchmen who will not come upon the general relief fund, are heavy sufferers. It is little wonder that he says 'the diocese is overwhelmed with disaster and broken hearted.' The reverence of God makes this an extra claim upon our liberality, and it is for us to acknowledge it by doing what we can to help our fellow churchmen in their need. We assert that

'We are undivided. All one body we.'

Let us prove the truth of it by suffering with the one member that suffers. I desire that a special collection be made in all the churches of the diocese, on Sunday the 31st inst, and that the money be sent to me for transmission to the bishop of Newfoundland, to be expended by his committee in the effort to restore to church people what the fire has destroyed.
