Foreign Legion Developed By Red Guards Movement

HONG KONG (Reuters) — China's militant youth movement, the Red Guards, appears to have developed a foreign legion comprised of a core of elderly left wingers and Communists from such countries as Australia, New Zealand, Japan and even the U.S.

Reports from China indicate that there are at least nine members in the centre of the movement, including American-born writer Anna Louise Strong and E. F. Hill, chairman of the pro-Chinese Australian Communist party and his wife.

Youths from a number of countries fill the ranks of the foreign legion.

CLAIMS TO BE FIRST

Miss Strong, 81, who is a per-

sonal friend of the Chinese Communist party chairman, Mao Tse-tung, said in her latest Peking newsletter she was the first foreigner to join the Red Guards.

She said the Red Guards made her an honorary member when she visited them some time ago in their headquarters in the Chinese capital.

Hill and his wife are shown wearing red armbands, the insignia of the movement, in a recent picture that showed them being received by Mao.

The couple, who left China for home Oct. 5, were apparently admitted into the movement during a visit to Peking for the Chinese National Day celebrations.

The New China news agency has reported the admission of five veterans of the New Zealand Communist party into the movement. Two of the five were named as William Devereux and J. Wolstenholme.

WANT TO LEARN

The agency said the New Zealanders had told the Red Guards in Peking they wanted to learn from them.

China's so-called cultural revolution gave birth to the Red Guards, who are modelled along People's Liberation Army lines to help enforce a stricter Communist way of life across the country.

The leftist New Zealand writer Rewi Alley wrote that three New Zealand youths were red armbands when they called on him in Peking recently and told him:

"There are some Americans, Japanese also—our Red Guard (movement) is organized on a class basis, not a national one."

"We want to be one with revolutionary Chinese youth. If things become tough, we want to play our part as comrades and give our best."

Toronto Golf Architect Here

C.E. "Robbie" Robinson, Director of the Green Section, Royal Canadian Golf Association, of Toronto, arrived in Prince Edward Island yesterday and met with Hon. M. Lorne Donald, M.D., Minister of Welfare and Tourist Development to discuss immediate development of the proposed 18-hole golf course at Brudenell.

Dr. Bonnell held a preliminary discussion with Mr. Robinson before the latter left for a first-hand look at the course in Brudenell. The Minister said that the visiting golf course architect would proceed immediately to draw up a plan for the new golf course and submit it to the Provincial Government for further action.

Mr. Robinson is a highly qualified golf course architect and gained his initial experience as an assistant to the late Stanley Thompson, who planned the Green Gables Golf Course in the Prince Edward Island National Park. He also assisted Mr. Thompson in planning the Cape Breton Highlands Golf Course.

Mr. Robinson, a graduate of the University of Toronto, is also a leader in the field of landscape architecture. He is a member of the American Society of Golf Architects, a member of the Canadian Society of Landscape Architects and is currently engaged in laying out golf courses in eight Canadian Provinces. He has also worked in the United States and Mexico.

Currently Mr. Robinson is remodelling the Henry Ford course in Detroit known now as the Dearborn Country Club. He recently completed a new course in Upper Canada Village for the Ontario Parks Division and a 27-hole golf course for the Corporation of Greater Winnipeg.

City Police Investigate Accidents

SDU President Returns From Ottawa Meeting
Returning over the weekend from Ottawa where he headed a delegation from St. Dunstan's University at the annual meeting of the association of Universities and Colleges of Canada was Rt. Rev. G.A. MacDonald, president of St. Dunstan's University. Other SDU delegates attending were Rev. V.G. Murnaghan and Dr. Brendan O'Grady.

President MacDonald this morning termed the session "a morning of special interest to all delegates as it coincided with the meeting of the Prime Minister with the provincial premiers to discuss the financing of higher education in Canada."

He indicated that finances also occupied a good deal of time in the AUCC discussions.

QUITE PERTURBED
"The university presidents were quite perturbed by the proposals set forth in Prime Minister Pearson's first memorandum for financing post-secondary education," he said. "We felt the federal government had not followed the Bladen Commission's recommendations to any worthwhile degree especially in the field of research. It was recommended to the Prime Minister that further study be given this important problem and that interim arrangements be made before a final formula is adopted."

Msgr. Macdonald also stated that it was the general feeling of the presidents "that jumping university education and vocational training for financing purposes was not in the best interests of higher education."

He said, "It was an almost unanimous opinion that the federal government should retain a practical interest in higher education by providing direct aid to the universities."

Russians May Fill Gaps In Maps Of Moon Surface

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Soviet astronomers hope to fill in new details on their maps of the moon with the aid of pictures from Luna XII, the first camera-carrying Soviet spacecraft to orbit the moon.

What they learn may help them to decide the best landing place for the first men on the moon.

The probe, put into lunar orbit Oct. 25, was first reported to have sent back pictures Saturday. The first two were printed on the front pages of Sunday's Moscow newspapers.

Pravda said the pock-marked surface depicted was in the waterless Sea of Rains, on the right-hand side of the lower half of the moon as seen from earth.

The two pictures, each covering about 19 square miles on the lunar surface, showed no big craters, but a number of small ones appeared as white-ringed, black spots on a grey background.

An official announcement stated that they were taken from 62 miles above the lunar surface, 37 miles further away than the close-up shots taken by the U.S. Lunar Orbiter I in August.

But Luna XII is swinging closer to the moon than either of the first two Soviet vehicles to orbit earth's lifeless neighbor, neither of which sent back any pictures.

The first was Luna X, spun into its orbit April 3 and was followed more than four months by Luna XI.

A scientific commentary in Pravda said Sunday: "With the large-scale photographs which we now have, it is possible to determine the structure of the surface and show up many new features."

Scientists will go on taking pictures with Luna XII, which makes an orbit of the moon every three hours and 25 minutes, ranging between 1,079 miles above the barren surface.

The Atlantic Development Board is to finance a study of the need and preferable location of an industrial park in the Charlottetown area of Prince Edward Island.

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Smoking Habits Are Reviewed

OTTAWA (CP) — A research report on smoking habits says men begin smoking at an earlier age than women, but find it easier to quit.

The report by Professor Herbert Lefcourt of the University of Waterloo was done on federal assignment and tabled in the Commons by State Secretary Judy LaMarsh.

It says the average age at which men begin smoking is 18.65 years. For women, it is 21.29.

Prof. Lefcourt suggests that men start smoking at earlier because of advertising "which deliberately relates smoking and virility."

As they grew older, men found less need to use smoking as a symbol of masculinity.
