

"Covers Prince Edward Island Like The Dew"

Liberals Make Big Bid in Ask. Voting Today

The Liberals have offered high rewards if they break a Progressive Conservative stranglehold on Saskatchewan—the only province not represented in the government—in one of two federal byelections today.

Prime Minister Pearson has promised a cabinet post to Liberal candidate Sid Buckwold if he captures Saskatchewan riding where the Progressive Conservatives swept to an easy victory in 17 Saskatchewan constituencies in the last general election. The situation is reversed in the other byelection in Nipissing where the Conservatives hope to gain a foothold that the Liberals have denied them in the Northern Ontario riding since 1921.

It raised a cry of "bribery" from supporters of Conservative candidate Dr. Eloise Jones, widow of the former member but Mr. Buckwold, 47, largely avoided the issue, arguing that as the province's only Liberal representative he would be a logical cabinet candidate. A former mayor of Saskatoon who won popular support as a civic leader, Mr. Buckwold trailed Mr. Jones by more than 12,000 votes in his first attempt on the seat last year, but this time he has been given all the support federal and provincial Liberals could muster.

If Mrs. Jones, a 46-year-old psychiatrist and mother of four is elected, she will become Canada's fifth woman member of parliament. The vacancies were caused by the deaths in March of Harry Jones, who represented Saskatchewan in the House of Commons, and Jack Garland, former minister in the Pearson government. Mr. Jones' seat was held by Nipissing since 1949. The New Democratic Party is the only other party that is contesting the byelections.

Mr. Pearson's promise of a portfolio to a Liberal victor in Saskatchewan where a Liberal was last elected in 1937, stirred the only real controversy in campaigns in both byelections.

Cyprus Force Life Extended

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—By unanimous vote, the Security Council Saturday extended the life of the United Nations peace-keeping force in Cyprus for a second three-month period through Sept. 26.

A five-country resolution with that effect, the approval of all 11 council members on a show of hands at a 35-minute Saturday meeting.

Less than 200 onlookers watched as the resolution was declared adopted in the climax to a three-day debate on Secretary-General U. Thant's request for an extension to forestall new conflict.

Bolivia, Brazil, the Ivory Coast, Morocco and Norway sponsored the proposal. Britain, Nationalist China, Czechoslovakia, France, the Soviet Union and the United States joined them in voting for it.

Boys Are Victims in Highway Pond

Accidents, one a drowning and the other on a highway, took the lives of two boys in the province over the weekend.

Saturday afternoon 14-year-old James Alden Home of Charlottetown lost his life in a fishing pond at Brooklyn, in Kings County about five miles from Montague.

The same afternoon at St. Edwards in Prince County a couple of miles from Miramichi, 10-year-old Joseph Ivan Albert was killed while crossing the highway near his home.

At Montague the accident victim was accompanied to the Government pond at Brooklyn by 15-year-old Steven MacAuland.

The accident occurred about 12:15 shortly after the young lad had lunch. While MacAuland was finishing eating, Home decided to take a boat to the shore to mid-stream and anchor, leaving another boat and one other for MacAuland. It is thought he may have lost his balance, and fallen into the water. He tried to swim for his shore but due to a strong wind, current and the heavy clothing he was wearing he played out and eventually went down.

Three fishermen, Denis Alfrey, Doyle, George MacNeill and Allan M. Doyle, all of Charlottetown, who were fishing from the bank heard the splash and cries for help and rushed to assist. However all they had was a boat and one oar. Steven MacAuland and Alfred Doyle attempted to reach the drowning lad. The wind and current made it impossible to get near him.

The accident victim is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Albert. A jury was empaneled by Judge Dr. C. M. Dewar of O'Leary.
